ABOUT THIS MORNING'S SPECIAL MUSIC

This morning's Gospel lesson on the Baptism of Jesus is closely related to the January 6 feast of Epiphany, as each celebrate the revelation of God the Son as a human being in Jesus Christ. In describing Christ's baptism, Mark states that as Jesus was coming up out of the water, "he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove." This imagery opens the last of T.S. Eliot's "Four Quartets," which consider the place of Christianity in deciphering the meaning of our lives. Written during the height of the Nazi Blitz of England, it counters Hitler's madness with a note of hope and spiritual triumph. Our worship begins this morning with an organ prelude selected to similarly "break the air;" consider Eliot's poetry as you listen:

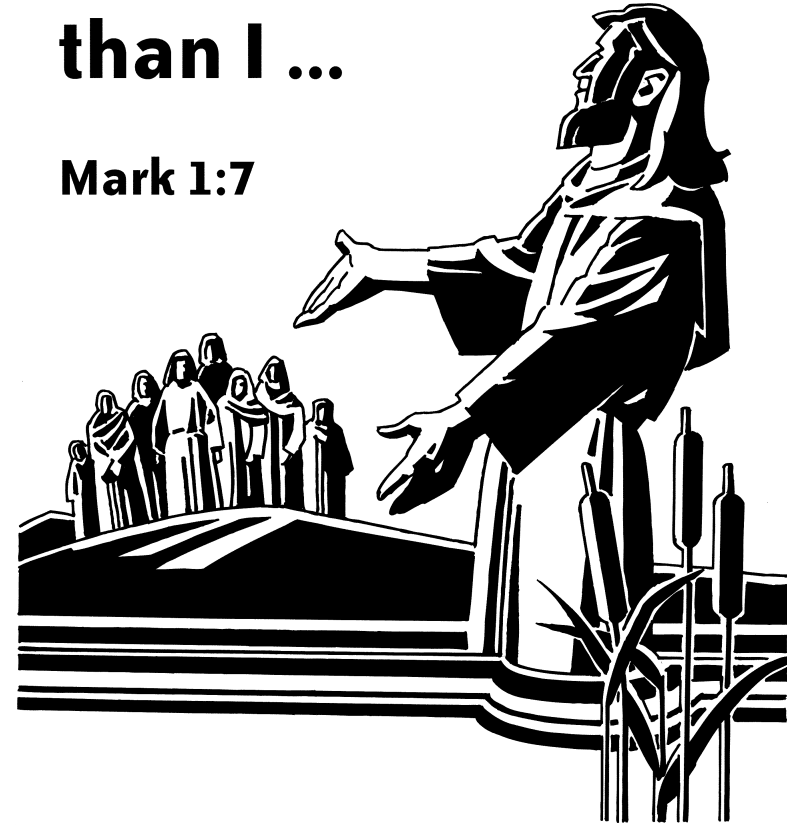
*The dove descending breaks the air With flame of incandescent terror
Of which the tongues declare The one discharge from sin and error.
The only hope, or else despair Lies in the choice of pyre of pyre—
To be redeemed from fire by fire.*

*Who then devised the torment? Love. Love is the unfamiliar Name
Behind the hands that wove The intolerable shirt of flame
Which human power cannot remove. We only live, only suspire
Consumed by either fire or fire.*

The choir's anthem at the first service is the simple, traditional American tune, "Down to the River to Pray." Returned to popular consciousness by Alison Krauss and the Cohen Brother's 2000 movie, "O Brother, Where Art Thou," there it accompanies a scene of believers at a river baptism. The words and melody may have originated as an Appalachian hymn, but also perhaps as a slave song. Epiphany, of course, commemorates the visitation of the Magi to the infant Jesus, and thus at the second service we will bid a farewell to our seasonal consideration of Christ the child with the quasi-spiritual, "Sweet Little Jesus Boy." According to the Reader's Digest Christmas Songbook, Robert MacGimsey wrote this carol after walking past crowded speakeasies in New York City on Christmas Eve, 1932. A white southerner, MacGimsey nevertheless wrote songs in the musical style of the African-Americans who lived with and worked for his family.

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Genesis 1:1-5

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters.

Then God said, “Let there be light”; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

Mark 1:4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel’s hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, “The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.”

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, “You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.”
