ABOUT THIS MORNING'S SPECIAL MUSIC

As we reflect today in sermon and song on Jesus' casting out of the impure spirit, the first service anthem be a setting of verses from Psalm 51, in which David pleads for forgiveness after his adultery with Bathsheba. At the second service, our Teen Choir will again sing "I Dream a World," setting a poem by Langston Hughes' first published in 1926. The setting they sing was created in memory of the victims of 9-11. As our nation prepares to celebrate African-American History Month in February, Hughes' words still resonate.

*I dream a world where man No other man will scorn,
Where love will bless the earth And peace its paths adorn,
I dream a world where all Will know sweet freedom's way,
Where greed no longer saps the soul Nor avarice blights our day.
A world I dream where black or white, Whatever race you be,
Will share the bounties of the earth and every man is free,
Where wretchedness will hang its head And joy, like a pearl,
Attends the needs of all mankind Of such I dream, my world.*

Our hymn after the sermon at each service was composed (text and music) in 1984. The poet, Thomas Troeger, writes: "I was eager to interpret the meaning of demons for people who live in a post-Freudian, psychological, scientific culture. While writing the text, I recalled when I was a pastor and a popular movie, "The Exorcist," touched off a wave of questions about the meaning of demons and exorcism in the New Testament." The composer, Carol Doran wrote the music "in an effort to express the drama of the moment of this extraordinary healing and to allow the congregation, through their singing of this music, to participate in a strong retelling of the story."

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Deuteronomy 18:15-20

The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: “If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die.” Then the Lord replied to me: “They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die.”

Mark 1:21-28

They went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, “What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God.” But Jesus rebuked him, saying, “Be silent, and come out of him!” And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, “What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him.” At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.
