# From Your Temporary Supply Pastor The Rev. Roger E. Griffith

"When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom" (1 Corinthians 2: 1 NRSV)

These are the words the Apostle Paul uses as he begins his letter to the church in Corinth. However, Paul goes on to say: "For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of the power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom, but on the power of God."

Everyone has an agenda, goals, expectations and a mission. Yet Paul admits he did not come with previous knowledge about them; although I find it hard to believe that he didn't hear rumors through the grapevine that the Corinthian church was in trouble. What I like about Paul, and always have, is his honesty; especially when he establishes a disclaimer that he is not writing to them in his own wisdom, but in the inspired word by the Spirit and the power of God. This serves as a reminder that we are under the Spirit and power of God as both individuals and as a Church. Paul's agenda and mission is clearly laid out as one of preaching Jesus Christ and the power of the cross. What the history of the church at Corinth once was is no longer relevant. The relevancy, is where they go in the future and what their mission is as a church.

When I came to you as your Temporary Supply Pastor, I admit that I did have some limited previous knowledge about you and your ministry; having served a year with you in my internship as a second career seminarian in 1995. Under the leadership of your Pastor who has remained both a close friend and colleague, I learned much about your church and ministry; way back then, and I have learned much more in serving as your Temporary Supply Pastor the past three months; thanks to a grant from the Lilly Foundation. Together, we have learned how to "rediscover the Sabbath". First, how to "remember it", and more importantly, how to "keep it holy" as it says in the Old Testament laws. Second, we learned what it means to take sabbatical time for ourselves; allowing time for spiritual refreshment and renewal in our relationship with Jesus Christ and each other. In my own spiritual life, being retired for one year but not yet having taken time for authentic Sabbath and sabbatical, this period of time we have spent together I believe has accomplished the mission. In my 25 years of ministry, I have never taken sabbatical time. The time I have spent with you has been good for both me and my wife. It afforded me time away from preaching a different church every Sunday as well as the physical and emotional draining as a contract chaplain with Geisinger Wyoming Valley hospital.

I think I could easily say that my time with you as your Temporary Supply Pastor has been a rich and rewarding experience. I have learned as much from you as I hope you may have learned from me. It is always difficult to say goodbye, but you have left me with a legacy of many good memories and the opportunity of making many new friends.

# PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

## JO ANNE SHEPHERD

Background Scripture: Exodus 2:11 – 4:17

Key Scripture: Exodus 2:11 – 22; 3:1 – 15

Key Idea: God calls us to service even though we may feel inadequate, the same as He called Moses to serve Him. His promise is "I will be with you" (Ex. 3:12)

In October we study Lesson Two, which focuses on God's call to serve. Moses observed a Hebrew slave being beaten by an Egyptian and in anger at the injustice, killed the Egyptian and then hid the body. Even though he was unobserved, the deed was known in the land, so Moses left Egypt and went to Midian where he worked as a shepherd and met his future wife. Moses did not feel really at home there; he was still connected to his life in Egypt. One day, while he was tending the sheep, he alone saw a bush that was burning but not being consumed. Coming from the bush he heard the voice of God. Moses was afraid but God told him he was to lead the Hebrew people out of Egypt with His help so not to feel inadequate. God was with him so ordinary human limitations were not a problem. Moses and the people all had to trust in the promise made by God. As a sign of the promise, God told Moses a name which the people can use to call Him, Yahweh. After this sign from God, Moses did not feel out of place again. Instead, he was confident because he was a child of God.

The same way that Moses felt, we feel that we are not always equal to the problems of life. But, like him, we are children of God and labor under His promise. He will provide for us the skills necessary to complete the tasks He sets before us. We have the gift of God's grace. Each person has different ways to contribute. God's love enables us to be more than we think we can be; to do better than we could do without His grace. Please plan to come to the circle meeting of your choice on October 15, 2013 at either 10 AM, 1:30 PM, or 7 PM. There you can learn more about the promise that God gave to all His people, through Moses, to always be with us.
