The music program at First Presbyterian has gone through some transition time with the new Director, Frank Jones. Frank was hired in September after the resignation of Susan Kelly. The

music program has been in good hands for the past several years. Frank is completely grateful to the church and the session for the support throughout this time of transition.

Our music programs are doing quite well. The Chapel Choir, directed by Kay Ten Eyck, has grown considerably throughout the year. There are about 15 students in the ensemble. They meet from 5:30-6:15 in the choir room. Chapel Choir sang at one service per month. Their singing and program time has been utilized quite well with assistance from Judy Cutler and Connie Weiss. They continue to have growing numbers into the new year.

The Adult Choir has been meeting regularly on Wednesdays from 7:15-8:30. They have been singing varied repertoire. Several new members of the church have joined the choir. Frank is continuing to seek out new members to join our choir. The choir has received a lot of compliments from the congregation and continues to strive towards musical excellence.

Bell Choir has been meeting on Wednesdays from 8:30-9:30 in the fellowship hall of the church. Dick Cochrane is the director of the bells. They, too, have been playing once a month at a service. The bells have had great numbers with some great anthems and benedictions at each service.

All three ensembles were involved with the All Church Concert held in November. The program featured several different soloists and small group ensembles, including Jeff Leas and Nina Daubenhauser.

Several members of the music program at First Presbyterian Church have been involved with the mending services throughout the second half of the year. The first mending service was a Jazz mending service. The second mending service was the Taize service. It was received well within the community and we will be looking towards doing more of these services for the NEPA region.

Frank is looking forward to more time with the church and the music ensembles of the church. We are consistently looking for more people to share in the music making of the church. Music is an integral part of the service.

Budget and Finance Report

The approved 2015 Budget was a deficit budget of \$17,057.00. During most of the year Pledge Income (Account #101) ran behind budget. This shortfall caused a reduction of cash flow; therefore, it was necessary to draw the entire budget amount of \$23,500.00 (line item #115). Strong receipts during November and December improved and eased cash flow. Pledge income (#101) improved where pledges were under budget by \$1,706.00 at year end.

- Thanks to Committees, expenses for the year were under budget by \$3,788.00. Year end actual deficit was \$12,084.00 vs a budgeted deficit of \$17,057.00.
- The Church was able to end the year with all of their obligations current.

The Session and the Budget and Finance Committee extend a sincere "thank you" to our congregation for your financial gifts and your many volunteer hours that strengthened the mission of our Church.

We extend a sincere thank you to our Treasurer, Wayne Griffiths; Nancy Owens, Administrator; and Dave Argust, our Accountant, who kept our Committee on target.

Building and Grounds Report Frank Garnecki

2015 was an unusual year in many ways. Unexpected events and expenses kept us on our toes.

- Two days before Easter we were close to having Port-a-Potties lining our parking lots for Easter service, due to a sewer line break. Since that wasn't the preferred option we scrambled to come up with a check for \$3000 to get the work started.
- The collapsing floor in Fellowship Hall was repaired not once, but twice.
- The elevator required two expensive repairs. One day it was up the next it was down we prefer when it goes up AND down on the same day.
- Sound systems repairs were done to eliminate feedback and static. Did not add the much requested "automatic sermon muter."
- Ditched the soda machine no revenue just cavities.
- Repaired/filled large crack in rear wall.
- Revised church logo with help from Dave Porter (Thank you Dave).
- Reviewed proposals for enhancing our outdoor bulletin board/church sign and possibly adding a cross to exterior wall. This was put on back burner for budgetary reasons.
- Extended time on kitchen timer to provide lighting at night for longer period.
- Invited C.S. Boro Fire Chief Hoinowsky to review our safety measures and level of preparedness for an emergency.
- Added signs over fire extinguishers, added emergency instructions on walls, held one mock fire drill.
- Added handicapped parking spots and still exploring others.
- Entered rental agreement with local business for 3 parking spaces.

Christian Education and Growth Report Jana Schillinger

The Christian Education committee serves the church throughout the year, providing classes for all ages as well as many other opportunities for the congregation to grow in knowledge and faith. We believe that Christian education is an important part of who we are and what we do as a church, and are thankful to all those who have participated in and supported our efforts. Thank you to the members of the committee, whose time, talents, ideas, and effort are deeply appreciated, and a special thanks to all of our WAY teachers, VBS volunteers, meal preparers, decorators, coordinators, chaperones, and others who have contributed to our programs this year.

Over several months at the beginning of 2015, the committee spent time evaluating the WAY program. After looking at our goals and progress, listening to feedback, and considering our options, we decided to continue to host our education classes on Wednesday evenings. We are focusing on what works well in the program while also working to make improvements.

Education is offered from 6:15-7:10, preceded by dinner and surrounded by choir rehearsals. Classes include:

- nursery (Spark)
- age 4 grade 1 (Power Xpress)
- grades 2 5 (Power Xpress)
- grades 6 8 (We Believe)
- high school+ (PresbyYouth)
- adults (TAGS and Faith & Life)

From July 13-17, Vacation Bible School was held for approximately 60 children each day. Our theme this year was *Everest, Conquering Challenges with God's Mighty Power*. We learned that God provides, comforts, heals, and forgives us – and that he loves us forever. Thanks again to all who helped to make this a great experience for the children.

Some of the other highlights of our year include:

- Three of our young people completed confirmation classes and joined the church in June.
- Ideas, inspiration, and new materials from the APCE conference in Baltimore.
- A walk through Holy Week was hosted with learning and activities for all.
- Youth events included bowling, crazy games, laser tag, iron chef, and mini-golf.
- Recognition of our high school, college, and post-college graduates.
- Recognition of teachers who participated throughout the year.
- Birthday cards sent to all children and youth.
- Our young children were welcomed into services with pew guides, worksheets, and children's Bibles to teach them how to worship together with us.
- Bibles were given to our third grade students.
- A pajama drive was held during Advent to benefit the Head Start program; more than 90 pairs were collected.

In December, an intergenerational event was held focusing on the Advent wreath. Adults
and youth enjoyed a meal together, created collages, sang, and made wreaths to take
home.

As we begin a new year, the Christian Education committee welcomes you to enrich your own faith and help our church grow in Christ by attending classes, inviting others, volunteering to teach, helping behind the scenes, or joining the CE committee. We look forward to seeing you soon!

Mission and Justice Committee Diane Scheuer

The Mission and Justice Committee seeks to respond to the concerns of peace and justice locally and globally by providing church and community members opportunities to serve and support those in greatest need through volunteer and financial support, advocacy, and education.

Volunteering opportunities for our congregation this year have included: our continued support at the St. Francis of Assisi Soup Kitchen by helping to prepare and serve a meal the last Tuesday of each month and each Friday, and collecting clothing for distribution to those in need; providing dinners on Sundays and supplies for breakfast to Bethel AME's homeless shelter during the winter months; mobilizing highway cleanup teams to participate in the Department of

Transportation's Adopt-A-Highway program four times a year. Beginning in January of 2016 we look forward to welcoming Williamson Jacque, a Haitian student at Keystone College for the next four years. After receiving his education degree, he plans to return to Haiti to improve the education opportunities in his local community.

We continue to financially support those in need both here and abroad. Locally, the committee supports the work of the Catherine McAuley Center, St. Francis of Assisi Soup Kitchen, United Neighborhood Center for the Post Foster Care Program, SCOLA, Appalachian Service Project, the Infant Care Program at Covenant Presbyterian Church, Countryside Conservancy, the Women's Resource Center, Lackawanna River Corridor Association (LRCA), the Northeast Suicide Prevention Initiative (NESPI), Tina Ide's summer mission trip, the Abington Ecumenical Ministry (AEM) heating fund and Food Pantry, and the Haitian Scholar Fund, established to assist Williamson Jacque with some of his auxiliary expenses, such as healthcare and a meal plan, while he attends Keystone College. Our church continues to participate denominationally through the four Special Presbyterian Offerings (One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace and Global Witness, and Christmas Joy) and the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) for Nepal relief. Internationally, money was sent to the missionaries Rev. Leith Fuji in Thailand and Dr. Elizabeth Searles in Romania, Reaching the Pygmies in Uganda, Doctors Without Borders designated for Syrian refugee relief in Jordan, and Groundswell International for the Nasonje Women's Micro-credit Program in Haiti.

First Presbyterian has again been honored as an Earth Care Congregation by PCUSA. Throughout the year, the Earth Care Task Force has offered informative table talks from such groups as the Countryside Conservancy and the Lackawanna County Conservation District. We are continually challenged, as Christians, to be good stewards of the earth we have been given.

Through the Annual Alternative Gift Market held this year in November, we advocated for and supported the artisans, trades people, mission workers, and farmers of Appalachian Service Project (ASP), Reaching the Pygmies, Heifer International, SERRV, and PCUSA Coffee Project, our ongoing coffee program sponsored by the Schillinger family.

This is a congregation that takes seriously the charge to love the poor and needy. Thank you for helping us care for God's people in our neighborhood and our world. Thank you also to committee members Barbara Decker, Melba Fialko, Linda Frangos, Meg Hatch, Fred Lyon, Phil Muntzel, Robin Pinches, Dave Porter, Donna Porter, Brian Schillinger, and Katie Taylor for their ongoing commitment and willingness to work for justice and peace in our world.

Presbyterian Womens' Report Lee Wirth, Moderator

The year began with a Board Meeting. Our officers remain the same as last year. I am so grateful for these dedicated women.

We continue to have our Clarks Summit State Hospital luncheons. They are held on the first Tuesday in April and October. We have lunch, entertainment and great fellowship. There are between 15-20 women that come out to help. We all bring socks for the guests. Janet Dobson is our coordinator for this event.

On the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, except July and August, *My Brother's Keeper Quilts* are made. We make about 50 to 60 sleeping bags a year. To date, we have made about 1,400 sleeping bags and they are distributed to the homeless.

We participate in the World Day of Prayer, along with other local churches. Each year, we contribute to the mission of the larger church through our Thank, Least Coin, and Birthday offerings.

In September we always have our Relate, Relax, Renew Day. This year we changed the location and time – we had a covered dish meal in the evening at the church. More people were able to attend and it was well received. Rev. Rebecca Tanner gave us an overview of our study for 2015-2016, "Come to the Waters."

We have three Circles for Bible Study. The times are 10:00 am, 1:30 pm and 7:00 pm. They are held on the third Tuesday of the month. All are welcome to come for study and fellowship.


Stewardship Report Heather Acker

Our 2016 Stewardship campaign was successful thanks to your generosity. To date we have 123 pledges with a total of \$273,626. This represented an increase of \$42,003. *It is not too late to send in a 2016 pledge card!* Based on cards received to date:


- 17 new pledges (did not pledge in 2015) totaling \$29,540.
- 49 increases totaled \$16,592
- 7 people decreased their pledge for a reduction of \$3,130.

This was offset by 21 pledges in 2015 totaling \$35,834 that did not pledge in 2016. We also had 17 people who pledged \$20,431 in 2014 and did not pledge in 2015 or 2016. The good news is that we had a net increase of \$6,169 over 2015 pledges!!!

Our actual cash receipts have exceeded our pledges in 2014 and 2015 by an average of 17%. We typically do not see this until December which impacts our cash flow.

The Worship, Music, and the Arts committee is responsible for those programs at First Presbyterian. The committee and staff work hard to plan meaningful and thoughtful worship experiences and other events that glorify the Lord and give our members and guests opportunities to grow spiritually and to honor God.

The committee members are: Richard Cochrane (co-chair), Betsy Ellis, Gayle Hamilton, Nancy Post, Connie Weiss, and John Weiss. Joining us are Rev. Carter, Kay Ten Eyck, and Frank Jones. The committee welcomed Gayle Hamilton as a new member of the committee this year.

The staff and committee members gathered in June, as always, to plan the music and worship settings in accordance with the Lectionary and adjusted to meet the demands and needs of our congregation.

The big news for 2015 was the departure of Sue Kelly, long-time choir director and Director of Music. Susan moved on to a university-level position at Tennessee State University in Nashville. In September, the church welcomed Frank Jones to the staff. Frank is also active in the Choral Society of Northeast Pennsylvania and teaches music in the Scranton School District.

Highlights of the year included:

- A Mardi Gras service featuring the Presbybop Dixieland Sextet and our own Bourbon St. dancing Lyons.
- The annual Jazz Communion service on Labor Day weekend.
- The Arts at First Presbyterian series.
- Continuation of the series of mending services, in a reflective vespers format, offering the Lord's Supper, prayers for God's healing, and the opportunity to honor our loved ones by lighting a candle in their memory. This year, we introduced Taizé music into the service.
- The Chapel Choir has grown considerably, with over 12 singers at most Wednesday rehearsals.
- In October, we marked the 15th anniversary of the rebuilding of our Moeller organ with a tour of the organ loft.

This year's Art Series, chaired by John Weiss, provided a number of interesting performances.

- The year began in February with participation in the Clarks Summit Ice Festival, including an
 art show organized by Elaine Tweedy, juggler Rob Smith, a Chili Café organized by Karen
 White and the Men's Bible Study group, and recitals by students of the Abington Piano
 Academy and the Erin Malloy Vocal Studio.
- In March we featured Rick Hoffenberg and Mark Laubach in piano organ duets and solo works, followed by the Marywood Chamber Singers, under the direction of Dr. Hoffenberg.
- The Duo Montagnard entertained in April, presenting a diverse program of music for saxophone and guitar.
- The audience filled the sanctuary for an October concert featuring Terrace Piano Quartet performing a variety of chamber music.

 This year's All Church Choir Concert in November included a great variety of solos and group selections, with Jeff Leas, trumpet, and Ninarose Daubenhauser, flute, as the featured guest artists. All of our musical ensembles participated in this performance.

We all look forward to continuing our service to the Church on the Hill.
