From Your Temporary Supply Pastor

"Remember The Sabbath Day, And Keep It Holy" (Exodus 20:8)

Some may respond to this Mosaic law by saying: "How do we "remember?" Do we mark it on our calendars, or tie a string on a finger? Does Sunday always mean its time for Sabbath or are there other days of the week where considerations could be made to help us remember to take time out of our busyness to have Sabbath? In the story of creation found in Genesis, it does say that on the seventh day God rested. After all, one would think he must have been quite tired after six days of doing all that creation and perhaps took time out for rest.

We preachers are used to hearing that this is easy for us to say since we only work on Sunday! All kidding aside, we need to take this seriously and clearly from the earliest traditions, to live the gift of Sabbath is to hallow time. This is how we keep it holy. Jesus is recorded throughout the gospels as going off by himself, away from the disciples after a long day to be alone with God. This is a spiritual discipline that we all must practice.

The psalmist understood that when he wrote in Psalm 46:10 "Be still, and know that I am God." Being still is defined as relax, stop and be calm. In many of my children's messages over past years of ministry, I would use commonly seen signs along our highways and byways that we can relate to Sabbath time; ie: a stop sign that brings us to an abrupt stop, a yield sign meaning we need to yield to God's will for us to take time out for Sabbath, or my favorite, a railroad sign (RR) that says to us: stop, look and listen. If we ignore the sign, we can easily be derailed. Case in point: how can we stop, look, and listen if we aren't "being still" long enough to practice these spiritual disciplines?

There is a deep need today to rediscover the gift of Sabbath. The need declares itself in the most intimate places of the human heart and in the broadest spheres of social and economic interchange. It asserts itself even where Sabbath is only a distant memory, even where the word "Sabbath" is not known at all. Across barriers of age and culture, the need speaks, presses, and makes itself known.

In the Church, the need to rediscover the gift of Sabbath sounds through both the best and most harried realms of our common life. At best, we desire to know more fully the overwhelming mystery of God's all-restoring love. Let's consider what the gifts of Sabbath are: 1. Sabbath is for our joy and rest which we can also relate to our need for sabbatical time. 2. Sabbath is for deepened communion with the living God. 3. Sabbath draws us into the sacred rhythm God has woven into all of life and creation. 4. Sabbath is profoundly prophetic. 5. Sabbath is for our life in community.

To live the gift of Sabbath is to receive it openly and with gratitude. It is to savor Sabbath's freshness. It is to walk in Sabbath ways, even when those ways set us apart from the culture that surrounds us.



PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Background Scripture: Exodus 1-2 Key Scripture: Exodus 1:1-2; 2:23-25

Key Idea: God saved the Hebrew people by using 5 women during the exodus. The people realized that God was acting for them during their suffering.

As time migrates (migration is a central theme for this study), we start a new Bible study in September. This year we will be studying An Abiding Hope: The Presence of God in Exodus and Deuteronomy by Janice Catron. This study will have us realize, as we wonder if anyone is there in our times of trouble, that God is always with us and working for our benefit. We will learn what it means to be a people of God who live in His presence. Even through sin and rebellion by human-kind, God chooses to give us love, faithfulness, and grace.

In Lesson One the story starts in Egypt where the Hebrew people did well under Joseph but things changed after his death and under a new ruler. He thought the Hebrews were too numerous and powerful so he increased their required labor. This did not bring his hoped for results so he asked two midwives, Shiprah and Puah, to kill all the male Hebrew babies. The brave ladies resisted the order so Pharaoh told all Egyptians to drown the babies. Jochebed, Moses' mother managed to hide him for the first 3 months of his life and then, knowing she could not continue to do so, she put him in a basket in the Nile at the place where Pharaoh's daughter bathed with his sister Miriam watching. The unnamed daughter found the baby Moses and saved him. Miriam offered Jochebed to be the baby's nursemaid so Moses was raised by his parents until he was five when he was returned to Pharaoh's daughter. Thus God's chosen, Moses, had a background of the Hebrew traditions plus the knowledge of court life of Egypt which he used to lead the Hebrew people out of Egypt when their lives in slavery became unbearable.

During the exodus the Hebrew people became God's people as a group instead of individuals promising to commit to God. God heard the cries of the people and acted in their behalf, which He had been doing all along. The people needed God and looked for signs of His presence in their lives as they struggled in exodus. Today we also call for help from God, especially in times of trouble. God helps and blesses us always as He did for the Hebrews. Please plan to come to the first circle meeting of the year on September 17, 2013 at either 10 AM, 1:30 PM or 7 PM to learn more about God's work in our lives and how we can pass on those blessing to others.

"Glory to God" – A Report from Montreat By Connie Weiss

In June, Sue Kelly, John and Connie Weiss attended the Montreat Music and Worship conference in North Carolina. It was an amazing week filled with vocal and instrumental rehearsals coupled with seminars on numerous aspects of worship. At the conference we had the opportunity to preview the new Presbyterian hymnal which will debut this fall. It's hard for me to believe that the blue hymnal currently in use at our church was published 23 years ago in 1990.

Our world and lives have gone through many changes in the last twenty plus years and so has the new hymnal. "Glory to God" is a collection of 850 hymns, Psalms and Spiritual Songs. That's 248 more selections than our current hymnal. Some of the new hymns in the book, for example, 'Gather Us In' will be familiar to our congregation as they are in our green "Sing" book. Along with contemporary selections some old favorites are back in the hymnal, such as 'His Eye is on the Sparrow' and 'Rock of Ages'. In keeping with the shrinking of our world there is a good selection of global music.

Speakers at the event include old testament scholar Walter Bruggeman and Kim Long from Columbia Theological Seminary.

2012 Centennial Campaign Update

As you recall, this 3-year appeal began last year in honor of our church's Centennial. The purpose of the funds received was to update certain areas of the church building and grounds, and equally important, to allow First Presbyterian to make meaningful financial commitments to some of the Mission and Justice causes that we know are significant to our members.

We are happy to report that good progress is being made, as shown in the figures below. We received pledges of over \$106,000 for the three year campaign, and we are extremely grateful for the income that has been received to date. The pledges fell slightly short of our initial goal, but our elders responsible for Building & Grounds and Mission & Justice have been able to adjust our planned projects to align with the expected income while still making improvements and commitments that are meaningful.


Mission Trip to Haiti

It was an honor and pleasure to represent you on our recent trip to Haiti. We travelled to and from Port-au-Prince without incident aside from one vehicle break-down and we were impressed with the wonderful people and organizations we met. We feel the capital campaign money is supporting good work in Haiti and your generosity allowed us to disperse an additional \$2000 while we were there. Briefly, we travelled to Jacmel and observed an organization that is working against violence towards women, prevention of HIV/AIDS infection, and toward positive and responsible male behavior toward women. We saw a tire garden and an organization working for sustainability and dignity in Cite Soleil. We met women in Gwo Jan who are benefiting from the Na Sonje microcredit program which our church funded. We travelled by rutted road and river crossings to St Michael where we met more women benefitting from your generosity through PDL. PDL provides training for the community as well as a microcredit program. Unfortunately we did not manage to see Pastor Cicerone or make it to the aviary, but our trip was full of inspiration and wonderful people. We look forward to sharing more details and pictures from the trip at a date to be determined. Meg is particularly thankful for the half of her travel expenses covered by the church and for Dave Porter's efforts organizing the trip and doing the legwork to find the effective organizations the church is supporting.


With your grandparents, create a special book to preserve cherished memories.

Excelsior Cornet Band, New York State's Authentic Civil War Brass Band

Sunday, Oct. 6, 2013 - 4:00 pm

In commemoration of the mid-point of the Civil War 150 years ago, we present the Excelsior Cornet Band, which recreates the glorious sounds and appearance of this pivotal period in American history. The band performs the most popular melodies of the 1850-1870 period, as well as patriotic airs, operatic medleys, marches, and dance music by the era's most renowned composers and bandmasters.

The leader of the group is Jeff Stockham, who has performed a number of times at the church with the Presbybop Quartet. Jeff participated in the filming of Stephen Spielberg's epic movie "Lincoln". He played tenor horn in the brass band of "President Lincoln's Own", which portrayed the US Marine Band of 1864. In addition, he supplied a number of rare original musical instruments (his tenor horn, a clarinet, snare drum, and bass drum) for the band's use; and he provided other props including twelve original M1840 Musicians Swords and the Drum Major's mace.
