
From the pastor

Dear Friends—

On October 31, 1517, a Roman Catholic scholar posted the notice for an academic debate on the door of a church in Wittenberg, Germany. He was troubled by distortions that he perceived in the faith and practice of the church, and wished to raise these concerns so they could be corrected.



Little did he realize that this action would set off a religious powder keg that we refer to as the Protestant Reformation.



Truth be told, there have been a lot of reformations in the Christian church, and there continue to be even more. The Christian faith professes that God's Spirit stays active in shaping and correcting the church. As the Presbyterians declare, "We are the church reformed, and still being reformed by the Word and Spirit of God." We don't pursue change for change's sake; we seek to be faithful to what God invites us to be and do.

I love even more how Luther didn't take all the credit for what he began. In the words from one of his sermons: "I simply taught, preached, and wrote God's Word; otherwise I did nothing. And while I slept, or drank

Wittenberg beer with my friends Philip and Amsdorf, the Word so greatly weakened the papacy that no price or emperor ever inflicted such losses upon it."

And yet, credit is due to Brother Martin. He showed tremendous courage and clarity as he preached and taught the Gospel, sometimes doing so at great risk to his life. The church is better because of his witness, even in these days when another spiritual Reformation could benefit both church and world.

October 2017 is hereby Martin Luther Month at the Church on the Hill. We will study his life and times, revisit his message, take a closer look at some of his foibles, and learn more about the forces that have shaped our faith. In worship, we will pray his prayers, hear instrumental music from his era, and sing his great hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" more than a few times. We will also hear sermons on the great themes of his preaching: "By Scripture Alone," "By Faith Alone," and "By Grace Alone."

Of course, like Luther, if you wish to shave a monastic circle on your head (a "tonsure"), wear an ugly brown robe, drink a bit of Wittenberg beer, and marry a former nun, nobody here will stop you. Especially if you proclaim at the top of your lungs, "To God Alone Be the Glory!"

Happy Martin Luther Month. It's going to be a grand celebration of an extraordinary saint's work.

Classes for Children and Youth

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2017-18 Arts at First Presbyterian concert series

The first concert in the 2017-2018 Arts at First Presbyterian concert series will feature two members of the music faculty at Marywood University in an Afternoon of Classical Music on Sunday, October 15 at 4:00 pm. Brenda Leach, nationally-renowned organist and Director of the Marywood University Symphony Orchestra, will perform an organ recital on the first half of the program. The second half features clarinetist Katie Morell performing Mozart's Clarinet Quintet in A and Mackey's Breakdown Tango, joined by a superb supporting group.

Dr. Leach

Dr. Leach has performed solo recitals worldwide at such distinguished venues as St. Petersburg Grand Philharmonic Hall (Russia), Moscow Cathedral (Russia), Notre Dame Cathedral (Paris), Westminster Cathedral (London), Washington National Cathedral (DC), St. Patrick's Cathedral (NYC), and the St. Petersburg Imperial Cappella Concert Hall (Russia).

Dr. Morell is an artist-teacher in the NEPA area. She is on the faculty of Marywood University teaching applied clarinet and select music courses, and at the University of Scranton teaching music history. She is a sought-after studio teacher and performer. Dr. Morell is a Backun artist and performs on MoBa clarinets.

This event is open to the public, free of charge, but a free-will offering will be taken. The Arts at First Presbyterian concert series receives support from the Pennsylvania Partners in the Arts Program (administered by the Pocono Arts Council), a Lackawanna County Arts & Cultural Grant, and numerous individual donors.




Chapel Choir & Alleluia Choir Notes


- White poster board

- Painter's tape
- Tempura paint
- Paper plates
- Paintbrushes
- Colored pens or markers

What you do:

- 1. Place the poster board on the ground (outside, if possible).
- 2. Put tape on the back of the letters and secure them to the board. No tape should be visible.
- 3. Paint and draw all over the poster board. Be creative with splatters, handprints and so on.

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him "the bitter neighbor from hell." But must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time? Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. A feel-good story in the spirit of The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry and Major Pettigrew's Last Stand, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others.



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Return Service Requested



Stephen Ministry

Often we are in a situation where we know someone who needs help but don't know just what to do. Here is a suggestion from our Stephen Ministry training: The best way is simple but often overlooked: Just ask.

A good example of why this is important comes from an episode of the TV show *Parenthood* from a few years ago. One of the main characters, Christina, has recently been diagnosed with cancer, and two friends drop by to cheer her up and bring her a roasted chicken.

Christina goes to put the chicken away in the refrigerator—where there are four more chickens just like it, leaving barely any room for anything else. These friends meant well, but because they made an assumption about what Christina needed—a chicken dinner—their help

was not all that helpful. They could have done much more for Christina if they had said:

"What can we do right now?
Do you need any meals, or help with transportation, or someone to run errands—or something else? We'd really like to help."

Then they could have acted based on Christina's response, and helped in ways that Christina genuinely needed right then.
