Elaine Tweedy will organize an exhibit of work from local artists and congregation members, with a juried photography show sponsored by the NE Photography Club on Friday night. The exhibit will be open on Friday from 6:00 to 7:30 pm and on Saturday from 11 am to 4 pm.

Also on Saturday will be a magic show at 2:00 pm by Eddy Ray, "Pennsylvania's Busiest Magician & Illusionist", who has been astounding people from the U.S.A. to the far reaches of Japan with his incredible and artistic sleight of hand, hilarious interactive audience segments, and his fresh approach to performing magic and illusion. This event is offered free of charge.

From 11 am to 2 pm on Saturday, our Chili Café will provide a place to warm up, grab a bite to eat, and listen to student musicians perform. Featured performers include singers from the Jessica Hitchcock Vocal Studio.

From the Pastor February 2018

Here is an imaginary conversation that is rolling around in my head:

"Have any plans for Valentine's Day?" "Sure do! I'm going to the Ash Wednesday service at First Presbyterian Church."

Admittedly, that's pretty bizarre, but that is how the calendar falls this year. It is conceivable that a few folks may arrive for our 7:00 p.m. worship service that evening, having gone out for a romantic dinner beforehand. It is more reasonable to imagine that some folks will skip out of worship, go out to dinner, and notice diners at the next table with smudges on their foreheads.

Some believe our modern Valentine's Day is a Hallmark invention, designed to sell greeting cards and sweet boxes of chocolate. Indeed the greeting card manufacturer got on board in 1913, and the holiday is one of their most profitable dates of the year. The truth is Valentine's Day began as a Roman festival called Lupercalia. It was a three-day blowout too wild to describe in a church newsletter. Suffice it to say it was an R-rated festival (or worse), vastly different from romance.

After the Roman Empire was baptized and the citizens deemed "Christian," the church renamed it after two of its saints, both named "Valentine." Each had been martyred by the Roman emperor on February 14, on separate years in the third century. Pope Gelasius I believed this re-designation of the festival would clean it up. Sadly, it only served to muddle the event in the mind of his people.

And what about Ash Wednesday? That, too, is a calculated event. It's scheduled by counting backwards 40 days prior to Easter, not counting the Sundays (which are considered miniature Easters). Since Easter is determined by the lunar calendar, just like Passover, it is on a floating calendar. This year, Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent on Valentine's Day. Weird, isn't it? Almost as weird as Easter occurring on April Fool's Day!

Is there a link between the February 14 holidays? Certainly. The link is love; not merely the kind of adulation that gushes sweet nothings, but the honest-to-goodness love of covenantal commitment. It's love that is not merely expressed in the heat of passion, but in the constancy of keeping promises and giving ourselves for the benefit of others. Love declares that commitments matter, that healthy relationships can bring out the best in us. We need not be in a relationship to affirm that love can change us for the better.

So this year, Ash Wednesday will be more than assembling in a long line of mortality, remembering we come from dust, and promising to make the most of our remaining days. We will take on the disciplines of Lent - prayer, study, reflection, works of generosity – as a way of enlarging our hearts and nurturing our capacity for the love of God and neighbor. We submit ourselves to the One who has loved us from the beginning, the One who will hold us to the end...and beyond.



The Underground Railroad: by Colson Whitehead

Cora, a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia, is an outcast even among her fellow Africans. When Caesar, a recent arrival from Virginia, tells her about the Underground Railroad, they decide to take a terrifying risk and escape. Though they manage to find a station and head north, they are being hunted.

In Whitehead's ingenious conception, the Underground Railroad is no mere metaphor—engineers and conductors operate a secret network of tracks and tunnels beneath the Southern soil. Like the protagonist of *Gulliver's Travels*, Cora encounters different worlds at each stage of her jour-ney—hers is an odyssey through time as well as space. As Whitehead brilliantly re-creates the unique terrors for black people in the pre–Civil War era, his narrative seamlessly weaves the saga of America from the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day. *The Underground Railroad* is at once a kinetic adventure tale of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, powerful meditation on the history we all share.


