

From the Pastor April 2018



Dear Friends -

A couple of days ago, I returned a couple of books to a bookshelf in my home.

It was then that I noticed a familiar book: one of the red Bibles that our church gives to our third graders. There it sat, with a thin layer of dust, untouched, unopened, and unclaimed. There is no need to report on whose name is inscribed inside. And I wonder if you have a Bible like that in your home.

We Presbyterians revere the Bible. We affirm it is the "unique and authoritative witness to Jesus Christ in the church universal, and God's Word to you." But a lot of us don't read it very much.

Why is that? Pick any number of reasons:

- I don't know where to start.
- I don't know which part to read.
- It's full of strange unpronounceable names.
- The language is too old.
- It's the only book I still have that is published in two columns (Got rid of the dictionary!).
- I'd rather have an expert give me a summary.
- I don't have anybody expecting me to read it.

So it is good news to me that there is a movement to help us read the Bible. It is called the **Immerse program**, and our Session is launching it in our church this spring. We hope to create a number of Immerse Bible groups in our congregation and beyond. All are welcome to take part.

Here is what they do. First, we make available an edition of the Bible that is accessible to the average reader: understandable language, arranged in a logical sequence, and lacking the aspects that make the Bible seem imposing. Second, a group convenes as a reading group, meeting regularly eight times at a time of mutual convenience. And third: the group has an "unmediated conversation" (i.e. without "experts") to explore questions such as "What stood out for you in this week's reading?" and "Is there anything confusing or troubling in the text?"

We are going to start this. The first volume is available in our office. It's an edition of the New Testament called "Messiah," and we will make it available for \$10 each. It is also available at Amazon for your Kindle (search for "Immerse Messiah"). We hope you will get one – and invite your friends to join you in a group.

We are looking for hosts to convene these Immerse reading groups, in homes or even in our church through the week. It is not complicated, and we will provide the ten minutes of training that you need. Please let me know if you are open to host a group.

I am excited about this new initiative and I warmly invite you to take part.



- Hidden Treasures of the Bible is a springtime Bible series to explore some scripture texts that we may overlook. Rev. Brent Eelman begins with Amos, Habbakuk, and Jonah (April 4, 11, 18). Dr. John Lawlor will introduce us to Ecclesiastes and Job (April 25, May 2, 9). Rev. Bill Carter will unlock the 2nd and 3rd letters of John (May 16). In Room 206
- **Sing Me to Heaven** is a two week study of John Rutter's Requiem (April 4, 11). Led by Alan Baker, he will offer an opportunity to listen to this beautiful music while discussing the history of such "Concert Requiems" and Rutter's specific inspirations. **In Room 210.**
- The Promise and Peril of Africa Africa is a suffering continent that is also full of exciting new things. The hope and life, and suffering and death do not seem to cancel each other out, but somehow grow together, supported by faith. In these two sessions (April 18 and 25), Charlie Pinches will share what he and Robin have learned about life, faith and struggle in their many trips to East Africa. He will also speak about the ministry to the Batwa pygmies in Uganda that our church supports with its gifts. In one of the two sessions he hopes to welcome friends visiting from Uganda who direct the ministry. In Room 210



Book Group: Commonwealth by Ann Patchett

The acclaimed bestselling author—winner of the PEN/Faulkner Award and the Orange Prize—tells the enthralling story of how an unexpected romantic encounter irrevocably changes two families' lives. One Sunday afternoon in Southern California, Bert Cousins shows up at Franny Keating's christening party uninvited. Before evening falls, he has kissed Franny's mother, Beverly—thus setting in motion the dissolution of their marriages and the joining of two families. Spanning five decades, Commonwealth explores how this



chance encounter reverberates through the lives of the four parents and six children involved. When, in her twenties, Franny begins an affair with the legendary author Leon Posen and tells him about her family, the story of her siblings is no longer hers to control. Their childhood becomes the basis for his wildly successful book, ultimately forcing them to come to terms with their losses, their guilt, and the deeply loyal connection they feel for one another. Told with equal measures of humor and heartbreak, "Commonwealth" is a meditation on inspiration, interpretation, and the ownership of stories. It is a brilliant and tender tale of the far-reaching ties of love and responsibility that bind us together.



CROSS CRAFT

Make this special cross as a reminder of Jesus' death and resurrection.



What you need:

- Adult help
- Piece of wood
- 5 nails
- Hammer
- 2 balls of yarn (blue and yellow)

What you do:

- 1. Hammer the nails into the wood to form a cross shape (see example).
- 2. Tie the blue yarn to the bottom nail. Wrap it up and around the top nail and back down to the bottom nail. Then wrap it around the middle nail and around the side nails. Repeat until the yarn is wrapped about halfway up the exposed nails.
- 3. Repeat step two with the yellow yarn. Wrap it around the nails until only the heads are visible.




