From the Pastor

September 2019

September brings renewed excitement. The school buses are running, the nests have emptied out, and the Steelers and Eagles kick off once again.

At the church, we put the fall program into gear. The choirs begin to rehearse, the bells chime out, and the classes begin. All the planning that has been going on since May is now revealed. Our Arts at First Presbyterian series is announced. Committees meet after a summer hiatus. Folks who have spent time at a favorite lake return to the church pews.

This fall, I am offering a sermon series on the letters of First and Second Timothy, called "Guard the Gospel." I look forward to sinking into those two documents from the early church. In them, a seasoned follower of Jesus offers advice and perspective to a younger disciple. The topics are significant and still timely:

- What's the Christian purpose for learning?
- How much can God forgive?
- What does it mean to pray for everybody? (and Paul does say, "everybody")
- What should we expect of our leaders?
- Is there a downside to having a lot of money?
- What do you do when faith runs out of gas?
- How do we handle words that lie, chatter, demean, and abuse?
- What's the primary purpose of the Bible?

These are some of the issues of these "pastoral epistles." We will explore them in our weekly sermons and also in the biweekly Men's Breakfast bible studies on Thursday mornings.

Another timely and significant topic is racism, and that will be a major focus for our church in the coming year. We will begin this fall with an adult series in our Wednesday WAY program. As a congregation that is "mostly monochromatic," we have a Gospel imperative to address the assumptions, biases, and privileges that come with being a visual majority.

As the national demographics change – and I believe that is a primary source of the virulent racism that is breaking out like a pox – we are called to love and welcome all the people God has made. It's easier said than done. This is an emerging frontier of Christian discipleship in America, even though the issues have been with us for four hundred years.

I'm excited about the fall, and I look forward to seeing you in church!

Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens (496 pages)

Although this is Delia Owens' first novel, she long ago distinguished herself as a gifted writer. In the mid-80s, Owens co-wrote with her husband Cry of the Kalahari, which was a best-selling, nonfictional account of traveling and researching Africa's Kalahari Desert. One of the joys of that book was the Owens' description of the natural world, and Where the Crawdads Sing is immersed in the natural world as well.

The story is set in the 1950s and revolves around a young woman named Kya Clark, who is from extremely rural North Carolina. Known by others as the Marsh Girl, she lives alone in nature-but the draw of other people, and specifically love, brings her into contact with the greater world. This novel has a mystery at its core, but it can be read on a variety of levels. There is great nature writing; there is coming of age; and there is literature. Crawdads is a story lovingly told—one that takes its time in developing its characters and setting, and in developing the story. You'll want to relax and take your time as well, and when you're done you will want to talk about it with another reader.

Classes For Children and Youth:

Christian Education

It's for life!

Spark Nursery (up to age 4): A nurturing class for our youngest learners, our nursery class will hear Bible stories, sing songs, play, and participate in activities appropriate to their age.

Grace & Faith (4 years old - Grade 5) experience Bible stories through our curriculum Growing in Grace & Gratitude. This fall is all about action verbs - God is at work in the world, and children will learn about the amazing things He has done. In September, we will learn how God Makes a Promise, God Blesses Ishmael and Isaac, and God Gives Joseph Dreams.

We Believe (Grades 6 and up): This fall, students will go back to the beginning by exploring the Old Testament. We'll start in Genesis, discovering the history and richness of the Bible as we discuss, ask questions, and dig deeper into familiar stories.

Classes for Adults

John Lawlor will lead Archaeology of the Bible: From Oral Word to Written Text. This two-part study will first pursue the questions: "How did the Bible come into existence and what is the history of the English text"? Part two will be a follow-up case study using the Hebrew Psalter [The Psalms].
