
## 2020 Jazz Worship

## From the Pastor September 2020

A friend was surprised to hear we are having a jazz worship service in early September. Not because it's a novel idea (we have done this many times before), but because the pandemic has restricted so much of our lives.



"Not to worry," I replied. "We are going to improvise."

Experience as an improviser has been helping me get through the past six months. As far as the jazz service goes, sure, we can't have a saxophonist blowing germs through the air. But we could do something. How about just bass and piano? And that's the plan.

We couldn't risk the normal kind of Vacation Bible School with many joyful children in close quarters. But learning about God, Jesus, and (this year) Moses is central and important to our faith. There must be another way to do it. The pandemic restrictions forced us to invent another way to do what we have always done. And it was so.

As we move into the fall of this very unusual year, we pledge to be safe. We also pledge to worship, learn, and serve in fresh ways. Our situation requires us to be ingenious. It also compels us to be helpful. What do people need? The Gospel, for one thing. A purpose for living. Ways to connect with one another and the world. A thriving church creates meaning for people's lives. It witnesses to joy in the midst of sorrow, justice in the face of indifference, and abundant life even in the thick of health restrictions.

We have not changed in our commitment to Christ, although the "delivery system" must be different during this season. As we improvise, we are not creating something out of thin air. Rather, we reach into our values and experience to draw out fresh vitality in new ways. This is something the church has always done.

As I write these words, a new technology system is nearing completion in our sanctuary. It is my hope that in the very near future, we will return to "live" worship on Sunday mornings at 10 a.m. We have prerecorded the services on Saturdays for almost six months, most recently with a very small audience of about 15 or 20 people. The new video system will allow for more immediacy, a very real sense that those who take part from the safety of their homes are experiencing the same service as those who gather in the relative safety of our sanctuary. My goal is to return to live Sunday services on September 13.

We will continue to offer Bible studies and educational opportunities in a variety of ways. As you will see from this newsletter, classes are scheduled for the fall. What's more, we will offer opportunities to reach out in service to our wider community. At a summer Session meeting, our elders were most insistent that we continue our Worship Through Service initiative as in recent years. Scheduling issues are pushing us to broaden this into a two week project. It's the same important work—in a different way.

You are in my heart during these challenging days. Keep our church in your heart as well.

## **Worship Through Service**

For past few years, Worship Through Service has been a vital part of our church's work, sending a hundred volunteers into the community to undertake service projects. This year, the question was, "Should we cancel?" The Session's answer: "Absolutely not!" So we will enthusiastic undertake our Worship Through Service program in some focused and slightly different ways.

This year, we will extend the event over two weekends in September. The projects and dates are:

#### September 20

**Trail Clean-up at Camp Lackawanna** - A team will work with rakes, shovels, and chainsaws to tidy up a trail at our church camp. Volunteers are asked to wear work clothes, work gloves, and sturdy footwear. Bug spray is also a must!

#### September 26-27

**Highway Clean-up** - At 9:00 am on Saturday, September 26, a team will meet in the parking lot of Clarks Summit United Methodist Church to clean up our adopted stretch of Route 307. Wear appropriate clothing and footwear. Bring work gloves and wear a face mask.

**Safety Net collection**: From now through the end of September, we will collect personal items for the people served by the Safety Net ministry of Scranton. Specially marked boxes are in the Narthex, and items can be dropped off whenever the building is open. We are looking for toothbrushes, combs and hairbrushes, shampoo, soap, wash cloths, deodorant, and any items that would provide dignity to the clients. The personal items will be sorted on Sunday, September 27, and delivered the next day.

**Recording Bible stories**: Through the weekend, we will schedule opportunities for our church members to record Bible Stories for children and their families, to be broadcast on the internet.

A couple of other **select projects** are anticipated with some small groups.

Tyler A. Canonico is the Minister of Music and Organist at Market Square Presbyterian Church in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, Alabama where he received a Master



of Music in Organ Performance. Tyler received his Bachelor of Arts in Music with a concentration in Organ Performance and Sacred Music from Lebanon Valley College. He studied organ and piano with Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman and orchestral conducting with Dr. Johannes Dietrich. Tyler has also studied organ with Dr. Jason Kissel, and piano and organ with Ms. Kathie Metz.

He is the organist for the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra, a co-founding member of Allegro con Fuoco, a keyboard duo with Jordan R. Markham, and is the Collaborative Pianist for the Central Pennsylvania Women's Chorus. Tyler is the Sub Dean for the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

Tyler is a frequent concert artist and a guest conductor throughout the country and has performed at both national and regional AGO conventions. He has been interviewed for both the radio and newspaper and has been heard on several radio broadcasts.

This event is offered as a gift to the community. The Arts at First Presbyterian series is supported by a grant from the Pennsylvania Partners in the Arts Program, by a Lackawanna County Community Arts and Culture Grant, and by private contributions. 

## **Adult Education for September 2020**

As we move into the fall, there are many opportunities for adults to grow in faith. Here are some of them:

- 1) Rev. Carter will lead a **Weekly Bible study** on Wednesdays, 6:15-7:15 pm ("WAY standard time"). It will take place online on Zoom, with the link provided in the weekly e-mail and on the church website. Each week, he will lead an exploration of the text for the upcoming sermon. Given that our fall sermon series will be based on the Gospel of Matthew's "Ornery Parables of Christ," it should be an interesting and provocative series. The Bible study will run from September 9 to November 18.
- 2) When we return to Sunday worship services (hopefully on September 13), Chris Norton will lead a weekly conversation on David Brooks' book, **The Second Mountain: The Quest of a Moral Life**. The study will meet in Fellowship Hall after worship, around 11:00 am. Some will remember this book study was beginning as the pandemic hit, so this is a fresh re-boot. Watch for more information on the start date. By all means, read this remarkable book!
- 3) **Short-term adult studies** will be offered on different nights of the week. The first will be a six-week study on **Spiritual Practices.** It will run on Monday evenings on Zoom from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m., September 14 through October 19. We will utilize materials from "The Thoughtful Christian," sending out a study article in the church's weekly e-mail which the whole congregation will be welcome to download. Those who would like to discuss each week's materials can meet with Rev. Bill Carter on Zoom each Monday night.

Future short-term studies will include a pre-election study called "Civility: American Politics and Christian Responses" and another study called "What Does the Lord Require," based on the favorite verse of Micah 6:8. Watch for specific details in the October Presbyter.

- 4) A new Immerse group for reading the Bible is forming. Most likely, it will meet online on Zoom, at a time determined by all the participants. Interested? Contact Rev. Bill at pastor@fpccs.org or by phoning the church office.
- 5) The **Men's Breakfast** group has resumed meeting on the first and third Thursdays at 8:30 am in Fellowship Hall. After a half-hour of conversation, they dig into the scripture text for the upcoming Sunday sermon, usually led by the preacher for that day. All men are welcome. The donuts are tasty.
