From the Pastor December 2020

Running low on hope? Here is an interchange between David Frost and Desmond Tutu (from 2005):

DAVID FROST: With all these problems facing the world, not just poverty, but the environment, the clash of cultures or religions which some people talk about - it's pretty hard to be optimistic. But I've always thought of you as an optimist.

DESMOND TUTU: David, I've never been an optimist. I am a prisoner of hope, which is different. I am aware as you are, and as so many of us are, that the world grows and there's so many awful things - poverty, Tsunami, the awfulness's that have happened in Sarajevo, ethnic cleansing, Rwanda, you go on and on and frequently you will say it is a real mess.

But it is important to keep remembering that in that mess good things have happened. And I have no doubt myself that this is a moral universe and goodness and love and caring are ultimately what will prevail. Not the ghastly opposite.

Bishop Tutu didn't point it out, but he was quoting one of Israel's prophets: "*Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope; today I declare that I will restore to you double." (Zechariah 9:12).* That phrase - "prisoners of hope - is a strong reminder that God rules over heaven and earth. As the Eternal One, God already holds the future. All the biblical promises are certainties: peace, justice, restoration, freedom from self-destructive impulses, freedom from human animosity, no more death, no more tears -- and most certainly, no more illness.

Advent is the announcement of what God holds in the future.

Our anxieties often stem from a lack of steady engagement in that future. As we hear of the promises of God in this season, weariness sinks in. We are tired of waiting. We have grown passive. Or worse, we've grown indifferent. No wonder, then, that the prophets call us to wake up! To return home! To lift our eyes! To get busy preparing for what (and Who) is coming.

To be a "prisoner of hope" is to be bound to God and what God has in store. Beyond the grim daily headlines, there is goodness, love, and caring. In the darkest time of the northern hemisphere, the night sky is punctured by the stars. We hope, not merely to convince ourselves to be cheerful, but because we trust that whatever God has in store for the world is far greater than what we have now.

So I encourage you to engage in the good work of Advent. Read the daily Advent devotions prepared by members of our church family (https://adventfpccs.blogspot.com), all on the theme of HOPE. Mark the days with Bible readings, prayers, and works of caring and generosity. Take part in our Advent worship services and sharpen your spirit. We pray regularly for God's kingdom to come, "on earth as it is in heaven." Advent is the time to welcome God anew.

### FPC Book Group

With the sharp rise in the coronavirus, the book group has decided to cancel the meeting on December 3rd. However, keep reading. We will re-evaluate things after the first of the year.

<u>The Other Einstein</u> by Marie Benedict, summary of which was included in the October Presbyter.

Such a Fun Age by Kiley Reid is a 320-page book.

Kiley Reid's debut, Such a Fun Age, will make you uncomfortable, enlighten you, and make you laugh—likely all at once. Emira Tucker is a 25 year-old living in Philadelphia with two part-time jobs (typist and babysitter) and no health insurance. One night the mother of the child for whom she babysits calls upon her in an emergency, and Emira—clad in her "going out" clothes— takes the toddler to a yuppie grocery store, only to be accused of kidnapping by a security guard and fellow shopper. You see, Emira's employers are white, and she's African American. The mother, Alix, is embarrassed by this situation and immediately takes the babysitter on as a project (unbeknownst to Emira) and becomes slightly smitten with her. Emira, meanwhile, loves her toddler charge but merely tolerates the mother, whose name she can barely remember. She's busy navigating her somewhat aimless post-graduation life and trying to figure out how to be "adult" before she's off of her parent's health insurance at the age of 26.

Emira and Alix's lives, although distinctly different, intersect in a wholly surprising way, raising difficult questions about morality, forgiveness, race, class, and parenthood. switching voices from the mother to Emira's boyfriend to Emira-the-friend to Emira-the-babysitter, Reid somehow manages to make her writing effortless and authentic.

### **Update on NEPA Youth Shelter**

Maureen Grey, the Director of NEPA Youth Shelter, was recently put in touch with a young man from Allentown who was abandoned by his family on his 18th birthday. Don (not his real name), on the autistic spectrum, was dropped off at the Catherine McAuley Center with a garbage bag of belongings and \$20. The terrific folks there called Maureen and she picked him up and brought him to the shelter. Maureen was able to house him in a hotel for 4 nights using monies from the shelter's emergency housing fund while she assisted him in getting a good paying job, obtaining a photo ID and opening a bank account. Maureen jumped through bureaucratic hoops and mounds of paperwork to help him obtain an apartment in the city so he can walk to work, church, health providers and stores. He moved into his apartment on November 1.

"Don" has made friends with his co-workers and has already started to get familiar with our city. His excitement about the help the shelter has provided him is palpable! Don referred to his short time here in his adopted city as a "rainbow."

Our church's donations to the NEPA Youth Shelter help to provide emergency housing for at-risk youth like Don who would be on the streets of Scranton, alone, were it not for the generosity of our church and others.
