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From the Pastor March 2021

When the church established its liturgical year, it modeled the season of Lent after the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness. It was a time of testing. All of creation watched with anticipation. What was Jesus made of? How would he respond?



The Gospel of Mark gives us a sparse account (1:12-13). Perhaps it is the most evocative. Still wet from baptism, Jesus is "hurled" into the wilderness. Like the nation of Israel crossing the Red Sea, Jesus steps into a series of challenges that reveal his character. Mark doesn't specify the challenges. Unlike other accounts, Mark summarizes the experience with three descriptions: "tempted by Satan, with the wild beasts, and angels waited on him."

Temptation is testing. Satan is not a major character in the Bible, but he is always crouching at the door. As an early church leader taught, "Like a roaring lion your adversary the devil prowls around, looking for someone to devour" (1 Peter 5:8). Face it: there are hidden forces that threaten to do us in. The antidote? "Discipline yourselves, keep alert." A healthy life is an attentive life. We discern what leads to abundant life and what opens us to the possibility of destruction. We must choose wisely.

As for the "wild beasts," we don't know what Mark has in mind. He doesn't mention lions, tigers, and bears. Israel's wilderness is barren land. There may be critters that come out after dark, and snakes that sun themselves in the noonday heat, yet they stay hidden from view most of the time. The inference in the text is that savagery lurks just out of view. Just as a peaceful protest may erupt into a deadly insurrection, so may a gentle animal turn on us fiercely with claws bared.

All the while, "angels waited on him." Or to translate, "angels ministered." Ever notice? in the middle of tough times, there is help. There is always help. Sometimes we are too proud to accept it. Or we can't see it yet. Or we may shrug it off. But the angels are there, seen and unseen.

During this long Pandemic Lent, which now feels more like forty years than forty days, the story of Jesus becomes our story. We are tempted in so many ways: tempted to destructive attitudes and behaviors, tempted to deny the true danger of what we cannot see, tempted to rush through the barren land, tempted to turn away the assistance of angels, tempted to avoid the important inner work that clarifies our judgment and builds our resilience. Lent reveals what we are made of.

I pray for you, especially in this season. Remember that you have been baptized into the covenant of grace, marked as Christ's own. Keep doing the hard work of nourishing your soul. Please count on me and the members of Christ's family as available angels who can assist you.

We will get through this long Lent. And we will be changed.


<u>Camp Lackawanna</u> is open for summer registrations, and our church provides scholarships for all kids who want to go.


