Jazz requiem premieres October 17

Our first Arts at First Presbyterian concert features two well-known ensembles. The Presbybop Quintet and the Lyric Consort will premiere "Lux Aeterna" ("Eternal Light"), a new jazz requiem completed by Rev. Bill Carter during his recent sabbatical.

"The pandemic has taken so much from us," he notes, "touching all other losses we have known. Drawing upon texts from scripture and the church's prayer book, I wanted to create music of comfort and beauty to lift us through this season of our lives."


The concert begins at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 17, in the church sanctuary. Dr. Alan Baker will conduct the Lyric Consort in selected pieces, and the Presbybop Quintet joins them for the rest of the

Offered as a gift to the community, the concert will be presented in person and live-streamed on YouTube (accessed through our website). It promises to be a moving afternoon and a stirring beginning to our new Arts at First Presbyterian season.

# From the Pastor

October 2021

Dear Friends,

We continue to make our way through uncertain times, with no clarity yet about when the pandemic will conclude or how life will look when it does. No doubt, this is unsettling to you as it is to me. The biblical cry becomes our own: "How long, O Lord?"



It's no help, either, that we are surrounded by "experts" who predict or prognosticate. Each week, my e-mail is flooded with articles on "the post-pandemic church," "re-engaging the dispersed congregation," and "where do we go from here if we're not done getting there?" A quick summary of this wisdom: nobody knows. Not yet.

There are lessons to learn from the past. The Spanish Flu took two full years (1918-1920) to play itself out. Not only did that pandemic take the helium out of the celebratory balloons after the First World War, it took more lives than First and Second World Wars combined. It's sobering to note that many Americans were suspicious of the best medical science of that time and the virus spread wildly. Foolishness has no expiration date.

Yet people in that era were sustained by the same gifts that make our lives worth living: tenacious faith, the enjoyment of nature, good friendships, finding purpose by serving others despite all constrictions, and developing habits of heart and mind that allow for creative expression. If you're reading this article, no doubt you are enjoying some of these blessings. And you know which of them are life-giving for you.

And yet, the uncertainty. So let me say something about moving ahead when we don't yet know where we are going. It is a situation ripe for improvisation. Take it from a part-time jazz musician: all of us can improvise.

Contrary to popular opinion, improvisation is not pulling magic out of thin air. Rather it's more like digging deeply from the compost pile. All of us have a fertile reservoir of memory, experience, and ability. When we improvise, we draw from these resources. The inventive saxophonist doesn't play merely *anything*; she reaches for the next right note, builds the next swinging phrase, all the while paying attention to what is happening around her. Her music is rooted in her foundation - the history, the tradition, the previous situations.

Yet, although the improvised music is shaped by what is known, it is not bound by the past. The true improviser takes risks as an expression of courage. She moves ahead, always assuming, "There is more available to me than what I have already known." There is a God-shaped future. All of us will move into the unknown by taking provisional steps, pursuing truth, reaching for beauty, and persistently swinging along.

Will mistakes be made? Certainly. But as trumpeter Miles Davis once noted, every mistake can be corrected in the next good note. We move ahead by courage, not by fear, always improving as we proceed. We drop the baggage of guilt, forgiving ourselves and one another. And we keep moving.

Am I speaking of life? Or church? Both. Improvisation is a deep engagement with our present situation, rooted in what we've learned, and always risking a future. God's Spirit is with us in the thick of it all, sometimes palpable in the creative bursts and breakthroughs, other times quietly in the shadows. By grace, we get through.

I believe these things. And I stay by your side as we continue this journey.

# Our "Social Creed"

From the Mission and Justice Committee

Each Sunday, we stand as individuals, a congregation, and part of the larger Presbyterian Church (USA) to "say what we believe," usually using the Apostle's Creed. Many have these words committed to memory in both mind and heart. But did you know that we as Presbyterians also have a "Social Creed?" If you didn't know this or have not paused lately to read it, we encourage you to explore this important document, intended to give people of faith a "short punchy statement of what we stand for in the world today." It is applied Christian social ethics, meant to help us practice what we preach in our daily interactions with others and the physical world, our personal lifestyles, and even at the ballot box. In this and the next two issues of our "Presbyter" we will share the words and some of the history behind this important document. A glass case in the hallway outside the Sanctuary will also be devoted to this topic.

Appearing in 2007 as a "Social Creed for the 21st Century, the statement was adopted by the National Council of Churches, encompassing a wide spectrum of American Christianity across more than 100,000 local congregations and 45 million persons. Our Presbyterian Church USA approved it the following year. Opening and closing paragraphs frame a Trinitarian framework that are essentially pledges of personal, communal, and global responsibility. In affirming them, we are led by the Spirit who is both "above partisanship and beyond neutrality."

### A SOCIAL CREED FOR THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY, PART I

In faith, responding to our Creator, we celebrate the full humanity of each woman, man, and child, all created in the divine image as individuals of infinite worth, by working for:

- Full civil, political, and economic rights for women and men of all races.
- Abolition of forced labor, human trafficking, and the exploitation of children.
- Employment for all, at a family-sustaining living wage, with equal pay for comparable work.
- The rights of workers to organize, and to share in workplace decisions and productivity growth.
- Protection from dangerous working conditions, with time and benefits to enable full family life.
- A system of criminal rehabilitation, based on restorative justice and an end to the death penalty.


# The WAY continues in October with in-person classes beginning at 6:15pm. We hope to see you there!


