
# The First Presbyterian Church of Clarks Summit

## From the Pastor

#### December 2021

"How long, O Lord?" It's a biblical phrase that appears only a handful of times in the Psalms and prophets, yet it is the quintessential Advent prayer.

Advent teaches us patience, a lesson we resist but cannot escape. Life is not something we can control. Sometimes we work hard for a blessing and are fortunate to receive it.

More often we work for something that mostly eludes our grasp. Maybe that's why a tinge of sadness even creeps into many Christmas mornings: after opening all the packages, we discover The Big Thing we hoped for cannot be wrapped and put under a tree.

We live under the illusion that material goods will fulfill us. Or that the next consumable relationship will satisfy. Or the next job opportunity will lift us higher. Or that if we push on a little harder, we will complete the race. If only that were true. Honest people pray, "How long, O Lord?"

We don't like to wait for much. This year, the Christmas decorations in the neighborhood have gone up sooner than I remember. One big box store redefined Black Friday as the Friday <u>before</u> Thanksgiving. Even an Episcopalian cleric of notable reputation has written that "Advent really begins in early November, right after All Saints Day."

What's the rush?

While those around us light up their houses and shop for cheaper gifts, the church reignites a four-week sequence of singing minor-key hymns, praying the laments, and lighting candles. Why? Because Advent invites us to inhabit the reality of waiting. Patient or impatient, we cannot rush what God has not yet provided.

My friend Terry, also on the brink of Old Geezer status, groans when reminded that mere mortals cannot manipulate their futures. He takes a deep breath, then exhales a favorite line from theologian Karl Rahner:

In the torment of the insufficiency of everything attainable we come to understand that here, in this life, all symphonies remain unfinished.

Indeed. And there is so much that is unfinished. How long will the pandemic persist? How long will injustice continue? How long will the rich exploit the poor? How long will our leaders lie? How long?

By naming our yearnings, we shake off the illusions. And our prayer begins to change. "How long, O Lord?" becomes "Come, Lord Jesus."

He will be here soon. Just wait.

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## Give a Gift to a Stranger

From the Mission and Justice Committee

I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me. Matthew 25:35

For many years, the Mission and Justice Committee has organized a late-November alternative gift market in Fellowship Hall featuring free-trade gifts from SERRV International. SERRV has discontinued their consignment sales program, so for this Advent you will find displays in the Narthex highlighting a variety of ways you can include "a gift to a stranger" in your holiday giving. There you will find the traditional pajama tree, but also information, catalogs, and order forms for our own Presbyterian Giving Catalog and Heifer International, plus lists of specific items you can purchase for the Pygmy Ministry in Uganda or for Afghan and Congolese refugee families that have recently been resettled here in Lackawanna County. You will also be able to order candy in support of local work for the Appalachian Service Project. For all of these "gifts to strangers," Christmas-themed cards will be available should you wish to make such a gift in honor or memory of family and friends and share that good news with them.

Building on the Presbyterian Giving Catalog's theme of "Small Gifts—Big Impact," we also urge that for each such gift you make this season to a stranger (be it through one of the above programs or some other organization of your own choosing), that you select a colorful paper strip from the basket in the narthex and place it into the slotted gift box to mark your giving. We will be fashioning those small symbols of your generosity into bigger, old-time paper garland chains and using them to further decorate the Narthex.

## Serving Refugee Families

Our committee has become involved with the United Neighborhood Centers (UNC) in serving several of our area's refugee families. UNC took over the

coordination of the refugee resettlement services in this area in 2019, and recently two Afghanistan couples and one 8-member Congolese family have resettled here in Scranton. Two more Afghanistan families are expected soon. Thus far, we have provided the families with both monetary and apparel support. We are still collecting items on their wish lists (i.e. rugs, clothes, etc.) and plan to collect Christmas gifts for them. Should you be interested in helping out, please look for us on Sunday November 28th at our "Give a Gift to a Stranger" event in the Narthex, that will continue to run several Sundays after that. Peace be with you and with our refugee friends.

World Refugee Day Prayer 2020 By Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, Director, PDA: "God of mercy, we can no longer pretend to be distant from the heartbreak afflicting your children who have fled their homes in fear of their lives, stopped at the borders of countries too overwhelmed to welcome, held in trains, awaiting a word of hope, huddled in camps and overcrowded shelters with nowhere to turn and no way to turn back. We can no longer pretend that the backpack in the desert, the small tennis shoe washed up on the beach, the small hands wrapped around the bars that cage them in, could not belong to one of our own. We know the truth: all of these children are our children; and their parents are our siblings. We owe them a room in the inn, a place of safety, a chance to live and thrive..."

## Our "Social Creed," conclusion...

From the Mission and Justice Committee

Over the past two months, we have reminded (or introduced) you to the "Social Creed" of our Presbyterian Church (USA), an important document of applied Christian social ethics that can help us practice what we preach in our daily interactions with others and the physical world, our personal lifestyles, and even at the ballot box. Opening and closing paragraphs frame a Trinitarian framework that are essentially pledges of personal, communal, and global responsibility, and in affirming them, we are led by the Spirit who is both "above partisanship and beyond neutrality."

If you are interested in learning more about the history of this statement of social faith, you can read online or download "Connecting to the Creed," a booklet that provides Biblical, theological and historical background as well as current application ideas for each of the Social Creed affirmations. It also has questions for discussion and links to posters and other resources. Just do an internet search for "PC USA Social Creed" and click on the link for "Connecting to the Creed."

The third section of the Creed calls us, "in hope sustained by the Holy Spirit," to work for peace in the world and to practice good stewardship of God's creation.

#### A SOCIAL CREED FOR THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY, part 3

In hope sustained by the Holy Spirit, we pledge to be peacemakers in the world and stewards of God's good creation, by working for:

- Adoption of simpler lifestyles for those who have enough; grace over greed in economic life.
- Access for all to clean air and water and healthy food, through wise care of land and technology.
- Sustainable use of earth's resources, promoting alternative energy sources and public transportation with binding covenants to reduce global warming and protect populations most affected.
- Equitable global trade and aid that protects local economies, cultures and livelihoods.
- Peacemaking through multilateral diplomacy rather than unilateral force, the abolition of torture, and a strengthening of the United Nations and the rule of international law.
- Nuclear disarmament and redirection of military spending to more peaceful and productive uses.
- Cooperation and dialogue for peace and environmental justice among the world's religions.

The complete Social Creed concludes with the following statement:

We—individual Christians and churches—commit ourselves to a culture of peace and freedom that embraces non-violence, nurtures character, treasures the environment, and builds community, rooted in a spirituality of inner growth with outward action. We make this commitment together—as members of Christ's body, led by the one Spirit—trusting in the God who makes all things new.

A glass case in the hallway outside the Sanctuary has also been devoted to this topic. Be sure to stop and look.


#### **Support Groups**
