I hope that each of you will put Saturday evening, April 15th (7:00 pm) on your calendars to come together in our sanctuary to experience CONSIDERING MATTHEW SHEPARD, a 2016 oratorio by Craig Hella Johnson. To call this a "performance" and to call those who will come "listeners" does not accurately describe what awaits you. The work does tell the perhaps forgotten story of the 1988 hate-crime murder (25 years ago now) of a gay college student in Wyoming, an "ordinary boy" who "never could imagine his life could be this story" yet became a modern-day martyr with federal hate-crime legislation named for him. But the work prefaces and follows that telling with the questions, "why retell, why remember that tragic event," and most im-

portantly, "what can we each do with the sadness, anger, and frustration it ignites in us?" (and with the barrage of almost daily stories we read of hatred and humans' cruelty toward one another.) Ultimately, the work is better described as an "experience" or a "secular sermon," perhaps even "life-changing." Come at your own risk, but please come because CONSIDERING MATTEHW SHEPARD is ultimately less about Matthew Shepard than it is about you, me, and us.

The Arts in April

This presentation is intended as a part of our larger Lent and post-Lent exploration of how we view and treat "others." That word is far from innocent. The central image in CONSIDERING MATTHEW SHEPARD is the fence on which he was tied, beaten, and left to die. Beyond the killers, the fence is the only witness to the events of that night, and it finds voice and sings no less than four times during the story, becoming, initially, a cross-like symbol of sacrifice, but later, something even more powerful. Just as that physical fence was later torn down, we are invited to find, pilgrimage to, and tear down our own mental "fences," those un-noticed lines and arbitrary lines we draw to understand (control?) the world but that separate us from others, be they

based on sexuality, gender, religion, age, health, nationality, politics, social class, etc. The first and last word of the piece is simply, "All."

A page has been added to the church website with additional information and links should you want to make learning more about Matthew Shepard and this piece a part of your personal Lenten discipline. You can learn more about Matthew Shepard and the Foundation that bears his name, read all the lyrics, and link to a performance of the complete work.

As Robert Frost asks us to ponder, do "good fences make good neighbors"?

From the Pastor

March 2023

Let me tell you about our Adult Education series for Lent, which will be offered on Wednesday evenings at 6:00 p.m. We will meet in person in Room 206 to reflect on what it means to welcome those who have been excluded from our circle of faith. The topic of the series is "Exclusion and Embrace," based on an extraordinary book by Miroslav Volf.

Dr. Volf teaches theology at Yale Divinity School. A native of Croatia, he is all too familiar with persistent conflict and intractable conflict. He raises the question, "If God is love, how can we welcome those who differ from us, love our enemies, and work for reconciliation?" This is a worthy topic to explore, for Lent and for every day.

Each Wednesday, the class will discuss a brief video, many of which are available online on YouTube. We will post the links to those videos on our weekly e-mail. Here are the weekly topics for the series:

March 1 – "Before Embrace" – Miroslav Volf

• What must happen before people who are estranged from one another can embrace?

March 8 – "And Grace Will Lead Me Home: Inclusion and Evangelical Conscience" – Mark Achtemeier

• What happens if a self-professed evangelical scholar befriends colleagues who are gay and lesbian? Will it change how he reads the scripture?

March 15 – "Texts of Terror" – Bible study with Rev. Carter

• Let's give a closer look to the handful of texts that have been "used" to exclude gay and lesbian people from church membership and leadership. What do they really say – in context?

March 22 – "Finding God in the Faith of Others" – Barbara Brown Taylor

• If an Episcopalian priest becomes an interfaith college chaplain, how does she embrace people of other religions?

March 29 - "I Didn't Mean to Be Antisemitic" - Amy Jill Levine

• An orthodox Jew who taught the New Testament at Vanderbilt Divinity School helps us to read the Bible without a Protestant bias. Or a Christian bias.

April 5 – "Overcoming Conflict, Hatred, and Indifference" – Miroslav Volf

• For Holy Week, we consider hatred – and how to overcome it.

These are important issues for our divisive times. Come and join in a conversation which will stretch us, in the hope that we might know the mind – and heart – of Christ.

Call for Volunteers Hickory Street Community Lunch

Community Meal

On Saturday, March 25th we will again prepare and serve a free lunch for the community at Hickory Street Presbyterian Church, accompanied by distribution of bags of groceries. This monthly program continues to fill a real need in that community, with requests for close to 150 meals and 35 bags of food. Volunteers will be needed for the following tasks, many of which can be pursued with children as a family activity.

Prepare the Main Dish (need 12 volunteers)

We will be making a new Chicken a la King recipe and those who have tried it say it is delicious. Make in advance (in a pot) and transfer to an aluminum pan we'll supply. Then bring to the church the day before. Make a Dessert (need 12 volunteers) Prepare a dessert (to serve 10-12 people) of your own choosing that is easy to serve or package for to-go meals. Cookies, brownies, sheet cakes are all good ideas. Make in advance and bring to the church the day before. Serve the Meal (need 10 volunteers) Greet guests and seat them or take their take-out order, package desserts, heat and serve/package the hot meals, fill grocery bags, clean-up. Start at 9:00 am and finish at 1:00 pm at Hickory Street Presbyterian. Purchase Groceries for Food Bags (need 25-30 bags) Purchase and bring to the Narthex items on the "shopping list;" copies in the Narthex.

Provide Financial Support

If you can't join in the work, consider making a donation we can use to purchase needed groceries and other items for the meal. Put "Hickory Street" on the memo line of your check.

Sign-Up Sheets for these tasks, the main dish recipe, grocery bag shopping lists, and a grocery collection box are available in the Narthex. This is very satisfying work; please consider getting involved.

After a two-year hiatus, we have re-established as an official PC USA Earth Care Congregation. In doing so, we join 10 other Presbyterian congregations across the state (and about 290 nationwide) that have publicly taken the following pledge:

The PC (USA) Earth Care Pledge (2010)

1. Our **worship** and discipleship will celebrate God's grace and glory in creation and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect, and restore the earth.

In education, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth-keeping, justice, and community.
 Our facilities will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respects and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds, we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we have in abundance so that

God's holy creation will be sustainable for all life and future generations.

4. Our **outreach** will encourage public policy and community involvement that protects and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation, and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships.

As the next step in this process, we need to establish a group, which we will call our Earth Care Corner, to seek ways to grow our attention and action in each of the above four areas.
