

From the Pastor May 2023

Back when I was a student assistant pastor for a congregation in New Jersey, we learned the preacher was leaving. After thanking the congregation for their partnership in the Gospel, he told us that he had perceived the Lord's call to a larger church in the Midwest. (Does God ever call a preacher to a smaller church?)



The congregation turned to me and asked if I'd like to preach regularly to fill the gap. I gulped, but said I'd give it a try. It was my senior year. Everybody knew I was looking for a job elsewhere. There would be a few Sunday mornings when I would travel for interviews. "Not to worry," one church leader replied. "If you're absent, we could buy a book of sermons and take turns reading them."

Was he serious? Don't know, but I was horrified. My education had shaped me to do my own work, and to expect others to do the same. Using another preacher's material was a form of theft, especially if due credit was not given. Plagiarism was an expression of laziness and grounds for dismissal. Use the sermons of others? Never!

That was long before the first contract to publish a book of my own sermons. I confess my pride in getting my stuff in print, although I grumbled that the paltry paycheck didn't reflect the hard labor of cranking out a book manuscript after hours. Publishing sermons has been a mixed experience for me, especially when I discovered they were sold as downloadable files. Unscrupulous pulpiteers could buy a sermon, change the name at the top of the page, and offer my work as their own. Ouch.

"Think of your writing as an effort to raise the bar," advised a published friend. Appealing to my vanity, she tempted me to think I was offering gold to those who had only copper. When I stepped through that smugness, I began to regard my sermon collections as professional contributions. They offered my nominal insight and a barrel full of stories that could help preachers who had a busy week. Other colleagues have offered last minute help to me, and this is my opportunity to return the favor. It was payback time.

After decades of preaching, I see something hollow about my old fears. The best sermons are not found in a book but heard in real time. They are released into the air. They can never be confined to a page. The good sermon bridges the gap between "Then" and "Now," offering evidence that the preacher has been dwelling in both sides of that pregnant space. And if a sermon ever does fly, it's largely due to the setting, for it has been surrounded by prayer, sung and spoken.

In a day of mindless show biz, there is always a place for one human being to stand before others and announce what is true. Most of us are hungry for an authentic and helpful Word from God. For the preacher, it takes time, study, and discernment to get the story straight. And if others find hope and encouragement in a preacher's limited efforts, God be praised.

There's nothing quite like hearing the Good News in person.
