# From the Pastor June 2023

Once in a while, you hear something that prompts you to sit up and take notice. Here's the last time it happened to me.

The speaker was Jim Kitchens, a friend who had flown in from California to speak to our presbytery meeting. We hoped he could offer some perspective on the profound cultural changes that have rocked the North American church, and he did that. We asked if he could challenge our congregations to try "holy experiments" in programing and outreach, and he did that too.

But then he spoke an offhand comment that got to the core issue: "If you want to grow your church, don't focus on numbers or external activities. Focus instead on increasing the fruit of the Spirit. You know, love, joy, peace, and all the rest."

He was referring to a memorable line from Paul's letter to the Galatians: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." (Galatians 5:21-22). The point was simply that a church flourishes by the character of its relationships - and these relationships are shaped by God's activity in our lives.

All these traits are a singular "fruit" (and not individual "fruits"), suggesting they are interconnected and emerge from the same source. From the context, Paul states that love, joy, peace, and all the rest are not inherent virtues in the human being. They do not come naturally to us. Rather, they bubble up as the Holy Spirit converts us away from our natural inclinations and transforms us into a new creation in Christ. Thanks to God, we become more like Jesus.

That's a compelling invitation for growth, and I'm going to take it on in a summer sermon series. I'm preaching nine times this summer, an identical number to Paul's fruit tree. And the weekly topics? Love, joy, peace, and all the rest. Each word gets a sermon. And there's plenty to talk about.

The cover of our summer worship bulletins will be a painting by the Mexican artist Ivan Guaderrama. He writes:

A tree doesn't try hard to make its fruit to come out; the fruit only comes out naturally and healthily if there is enough water, nutrients, sun, and proper conditions for the fruit to grow. Just as the believer who receives sound teaching, has fellowship with Jesus, prays, and obeys in faith - from the believer will grow love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faith, gentleness, goodness, and self-control. The fruit of the Spirit.

I hope you can join us for this very special sermon series, whether in person or as broadcast and recorded on YouTube. And if you're interested in going deeper, I commend a wonderful book by Christopher J.H. Wright, titled, <u>Cultivating the Fruit of the Spirit: Growing in Christlikeness</u> (IVP Books, 2017).

#### Church Life

Thanks to all of you who filled out the survey we had in the bulletin for several weeks. We were pleased with the response with many people showing an interest in a First Aid Course.

We are hoping to have someone from the Center for Public Safety do a CPR/DEA class on an upcoming Saturday morning. The DEA part of the class is on learning how to use a defibrillator. The church plans to purchase a defibrillator in the near future so the class will be scheduled once we have made that purchase.

There are two options for the class: those who want to receive a certification and those who just want to have basic knowledge on how to handle an emergency situation. The class with the certification costs \$52 and the non-certified class costs \$25. They will be held at the same time but the class for those who don't wish to be certified will last for 2 to 2 ½ hours and those getting certified will have to stay approximately an hour longer to take a test assuring the instructor that they fully understand everything that was taught.

We need to know who is definitely interested in pursuing this and which class you would be interested in so we can proceed. Please call me at 570-806-1591, email me at jodihall@nep.net or chat with me after church as to your intentions so we can get the class scheduled.

investing in our greatest resource Help youth begin life with a solid foundation of faith.

Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life. By contributing to the Pentecost Offering, you are nurturing the faith of those who are the church to come — children, youth, and young adults.

Please consider donating to The Pentecost Offering, which breaks down in the following way: 25% goes to the Young Adult Volunteer experience, 25% supports ministries with youth, ages 12-18, and those called to accompany them, 10% supports the "Educate a Child, Transform the World", and 40% remains with our congregation to support ministries with children and youth in our local community.

This year, we will use the 40% to support our local NEPA Youth Shelter, which offers an after-school drop in center for high school students and facilitates a Rapid Rehousing Program for homeless teens aged 18-21. In order to protect the safety of the drop-in center and its teen participants from local gang members, the Youth Shelter has had to incur unexpected expenses of hiring security during the hours of operation. We are hoping our donation will help with these expenses.
