

Here is a question worth pondering: how have you become a Christian? Here's my answer: "Slowly."

Notice that I didn't ask, "When did you become a Christian?" As if there was a

datable moment of wakening or clarification. Those moments do come. For me, they come with some frequency. I have doubts, just like any thinking person. I have moral lapses too, although a newsletter is not a place to confess them. Every so often, the Holy Spirit shakes me awake from spiritual slumber and my faith is energized. Perhaps an insight will come while preparing a sermon, listening to a big piece of music, or talking with one of you. Or the sky splits open, a sunbeam lands on my

No doubt some of my becoming Christian has been brokered through the church. It began as my parents took me to worship, dropped me off for classes, and pointed me to the cookie table in Fellowship Hall. I learned by osmosis to sing the hymns, speak the creed, and discern the location of "Moon Hall" (i.e., "Praise God from Moon Hall..."). Sitting through sermons opened the way to increasing comprehension. One astonishing day, I realized I believed "all that stuff." My mental assent was accompanied by a heart full of trust.

Faith takes a while to develop. It is not an Instant Breakfast drink to gulp down in the morning. Beyond my wet baptism or any initial insights, faith had to be formed in me. It's been a process. It's an unfolding journey. There have been twists and turns in the road. No doubt there will be more to come.

Among my clerical ilk, there's been a development in language. The term "Christian Education" is shifting toward something called "Faith Formation." It affirms what we have learned by hard experience, namely, that you can take a kid to religious education classes, but that's no assurance a heart has been warmed or a hard head has been opened. There's no instant guarantee that young people will continue participating in the church where they were brought up. If that were the case, where are the sixteen other Baby Boomers that were in my confirmation class? Most aren't sitting in a pew on Sunday morning. The world won them over.

But faith can still be formed. It's never too late. Faith can come through a variety of complementary formats, including worship, classroom, service projects, spiritual disciplines, and participation in a community of Christian people. There is content to our beliefs that can be sung. There is a love that can be shared. There are injustices to be uncovered and addressed. There is a hope to be discovered and claimed.

As we move into the fall, I encourage you to renew and develop your faith. Make a commitment to attend worship regularly. Take part in one of our classes. Join a project that reaches out to those in need. Show up and join us on the journey. We will be glad to see you. We trust you will be glad to be here.

#### Presbyterian Women Bible Study begins Tuesday, September 19.

In this new study, readers are invited to consider Jesus, "the good shepherd" (Luke 10:15), who shared the Good News through sacred encounters with everyday people. The Gospel According to Luke and the book of the Acts of the Apostles, or Luke-Acts "one story in two parts," demonstrate the unfolding of God's redemptive purposes in human history and present a distinctive perspective on the person and work of Jesus Christ. Written by Luke, a physician and travelling companion of Paul, the message to the early Christian community (and to us) is radical, inclusive, and hope-filled. The group, including Rev. Carter (leader), will gather on the third Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. All women are welcome!

**Men's Breakfast and Bible Study** meets for donuts and Bible study on the first and third Thursday of every month. They gather for conversation at 8:30 a.m. in the Session Room (206) and have their study from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. They normally discuss the scripture text for the following Sunday's sermon.

"O God of Peace at all times in all ways, grant us your peace and help us to imagine a world where your justice and peace are ever known". Amen.



During September, a **Season of Peace** (designated by the national Presbyterian Church) will be observed for four weeks from Sunday September 3rd until World Communion Sunday on October 1st. This month-long pilgrimage is designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, small groups, families, and individuals. Participants are invited to define and deepen their calling as peacemakers through daily reflections that address some of the major issues of our time (climate change, nonviolence, the intersection of poverty and racism, and immigration/migration).

To receive these daily reflections in your email during Season of Peace, subscribe at pcusa.org/subscribeSOP.

Also, as in last year, be on the lookout for Peace Cards that will be in the Narthex and on tables during coffee hour (they offer a question for reflection, an action to be taken and a prayer to be spoken).

During this Season of Peace, we will be collecting our **Peace and Global Witness Special Offering**. A gift to this offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. 50% of this offering will be used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. 25% will be used by mid councils for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The final 25% is designated for local congregations to continue with peacemaking efforts of their choice. This year, we will be donating our **25% congregational portion** to **The Gathering Place** in Clarks Summit, with our funds designated to assist both their:

**Memory Cafe:** a place where people with memory loss and their care companions can share a cup of coffee and socialize with others. They can explore art, music, play games, experience gentle yoga, or just enjoy being with others.

&

**Unified and special needs classes and programs** that are intended to offer adults with varying abilities more opportunities to advance their interests and be part of the community. These classes/programs include the following:

- 1) Cooking with Friends
- 2) <u>Craft & Chat</u> A casual setting where artists with & without special needs come together to create & relate.
- 3) <u>Growing Together Garden Club</u> Master Gardeners of NEPA will supervise enthusiastic gardeners of varying abilities. This year we will be installing two raised-bed pollinator gardens in the Pocket Park on Depot Street.
- 4) All Access Acting An acting class focused on self-expression & emotional, social intuition.

Such a worthy way to promote peacemaking with our neighbors and participants at **The Gathering Place** along with supporting the national church's peacemaking efforts across the world through this offering! You can make your donations on line via our church's website.




