


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Notes from the Session Meeting

From the Pastor

October 2023



A retired professor from a university was lamenting about faculty meetings, which he does not miss in his retirement. "I left frustrated every time," he said. "Small and inconsequential matters were magnified. Excess energy was burned over nothing. Most of the arguments were about the egos of the faculty members, who gave speeches about their expertise and obliterated their 'opponents' through clenched teeth. And I kept wondering: What would it take for those people to agree on anything?"

Good question, and an indication of the times we are in.

Forceful opinions are stated everywhere, fueled by the information bubbles where most of us reside. We are so accustomed to surrounding ourselves with voices of agreement that we don't know how to find common ground with our perceived enemies. And we have been so conditioned by the battles, either personal or social, that we have descended into the posture of winning by all means necessary. The result? Fractures, emotional and otherwise, with precious little agreement.

The church of Jesus Christ does not stand above the fray. I've heard about down-in-the-mud arguments about the color of a new sanctuary carpet. Members of the same church staff pounce on one another over turf battles. A good pastoral friend thought he was called to serve a "purple" church, politically neither red nor blue; he was shown the exit door because one faction perceived he was a little too blue. Ah, we are merely the world...under the sign of the cross.

The apostle Paul, no stranger to his own skirmishes, gets wind that the folks in his beloved congregation in Philippi were griping and sniping. Quite early in his letter to the congregation, he exhorts them to be "standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents." (Philippians 1:27-28). It is good advice, if not a bit euphemistic.

So, he digs in with more specificity: "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit," he says, "and in humility, count others as better than yourselves." Most of all, "Have the same mind that was in Christ Jesus, who emptied himself..."

This is one of the most remarkable invitations of the Christian Bible. It's the voluntary setting-aside of all privilege and power. It's the intentional refusal to insist on our own way. It is the choice to be in communion with others, rather than claiming to be "right" on all matters. It's the kneeling to wash the feet of those around you, choosing to serve them rather than dominate them. Just like Jesus. Which is to say, it is truly to live under the sign of the cross.

A world that feeds on competition and dominance cannot understand this. Not yet. But let the church of Christ Jesus lead the way if it is able. As a secular observer marveled at an early Christian community, "See how they love another."

News from your Mission & Justice Committee Hope for Haiti

Our decades-long connection to the Haitian village of Gwo-Jan continues. At the point of this connection stands our friend Yaya, who lived among us while achieving his college degree and then returned to attempt good work amid the despair, frustrations, and very real dangers of his home. He persists in his work and dream to build a better Haiti for himself, his family and friends, and the future. Most of the time, the odds of success appear slim at best. Haiti is the poster child for a failed state, with a long history of inept, ineffective, and corrupt leaders, governed now in the day-to-day as much by gangs as by its broken political system.

A story that is often remembered and referenced by the Mission and Justice Committee is that of a man walking down the beach that comes across a scene of thousands of starfish washed up on the sand and dying. The man begins to toss them one-by-one back into the ocean. A passerby notes the futility of his effort, commenting that he cannot possibly save them all. The man simply responds by picking up another starfish and replying, "Yes, but I can save this one."

We recently received from Yaya the names of 13 Gwo-Jan children, ranging in age from 4-19 and ready for school grades K-7th. They lack the required tuition to attend, which ranges from \$ 115.00 - \$ 375.00 per student. They are a snapshot of Gwo-Jan's future, destined to be recruited by the local gangs but possibly-through this schooling--to find a way to avoid that fate, perhaps even to follow in Yaya's footsteps and someday join him in the difficult work of building a safer and better-functioning community. Please take a moment to read their names and offer a prayer for them:

Saïsha, age 7 Annie, age 7 Redashkaïna Bechaëlle, age 6 Marvens, age 11 Naïra, age 4 Soraya, age 4 Rosalanda, age 7 Ovensly, age 11 Bifendel, age 13 Jonas, age 19 Anne Rose, age 12 Gavenchy, age 12



Their schools are mostly in the main city of Petion Ville or the local town of Pernier. Most of the children will probably walk for about 30 minutes to get there. Taking a tap tap (small trucks that provide public transportation) would cost about \$ 1.50 each day and take even longer due to the road traffic. The families will also need to buy school supplies, uniforms, and books that further cost around \$ 150.00 each year.

After much discussion, we are determined to help them in the present even while not knowing if or how we can continue to assist them in the coming years. But for today we have stepped forward in faith to support these "Gwo-Jan 13," though doing so essentially emptied our special fund for National and International Relief. So, if you would like to be a part of our shepherding of these 13 children, watch at this year's Advent "Gifts for Strangers" event for the opportunity to make a gift of education for the children of Gwo-Jan, those gifts to replenish the fund and ensure our continuing help. If you would like to direct help sooner or later, you can at any time direct a donation to account #2037 and specify its use for "Haiti Tuitions." The average annual tuition per child is about \$170.00.

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Christian Education: Growing in Faith and Love

Bible Time: An opportunity for our young children (age 4 to approx. grade 4) to hear Bible stories told in a fun and engaging way, weekly **Bible Time** will happen during worship, for about 20 minutes. Children will be invited to attend after the anthem and will return for prayers and the end of the service.



October stories will include: Jesus teaching the disciples how to pray, the creation story, Adam and Eve, Noah's Ark, and God's promise to Abraham.



We Worship Together series: Why do we say the Lord's Prayer? What is communion all about? What are we waiting for during Advent? These questions and more will be answered in a new series for children. The program will last about 30 minutes and will be held after worship; parents will be invited to sign up, and each family will receive a book to take home related to the topic discussed.

Our first program will be held on **Sunday, October 8** on the topic of **Communion**. The next class in the series will be held on Sunday, November 19 to learn about the upcoming season of **Advent.** Later topics will include Baptism, the Lord's Prayer, and Pentecost.



New this year: We will host a **Blessing of the Animals** on Saturday, October 7, at 11:00 a.m. in the lower parking lot (adjacent to Fellowship Hall). All are invited to bring their pets for a brief liturgy and a blessing. Cats, lizards, birds, and dogs on a leash are all cordially invited.
