

October10, 2023

- 1. The Finance Committee presented a preliminary budget for 2024 to Session. Discussion took place and it will be finalized at a future meeting.
- Session was asked to consider attending a joint meeting of Lackawanna and Lehigh Presbyteries on Saturday, November 18 at Camp Johnsonburg, which is across the river from Delaware Water Gap.
- Rev. Carter has agreed to be nominated as moderator for Lackawanna Presbytery. This is a second year of a three-year commitment which included serving as moderator of the presbytery's council for the third year.

From the Pastor

November 2023



When somebody asks, "What should I read to nourish my spiritual life?" here is my ready answer: start with the Psalms. Read three each day. This has been my devotional practice for many years. Like any spiritual habit, there have been stops, starts, and pauses. Yet I can't think of a more important text for the formation of the soul.

My connection to these poetic texts began early. I grew up in a church where the invitation to "Enter into His Gates with Thanksgiving" was inscribed high above the central archway. The text was reinforced when I was required to memorize it in context. The words came from Psalm 100, a simple poem with profound simplicity and depth.

The Psalms have been a constant presence in my life. Growing up in the church, I encountered countless snippets of Psalm verses, and remember having to memorize a few shorter Psalms before I received my third grade Bible. As I discerned God's call to ministry, I realized how much those many verses have conditioned me and given me a vocabulary for prayer.

In mid-life, I discovered a curious thing. Many Psalm verses are neglected or edited out of our little devotional guides or daily readings. For instance, you can purchase a pictorial calendar with soaring verses that match the mountains they portray – perhaps a shot of Mount McKinley with the words, "I look to the mountains; where does my help come from?" (Psalm 121:1)

Many of those Psalm excerpts exude a happy faith, a trusting, rejoicing, thankful faith—but we tend to overlook the Psalms that echo forsakenness, cry out in need, or verbalize lament. The Psalms invite utter honesty in every prayer in every circumstance. God is not only present on the mountain peak. The Holy One accompanies us in the valleys too.

When we read the "other" psalms, the ones not so victorious, we encounter honest words about our condition of austerity. Superficial religion fades. A lot of trappings are scraped away. When I've sojourned to empty deserts and simple monasteries, I've mulled over how much of my prayer seems superficial, too. Such honesty strips away the trappings of affluence, success, and worldly achievement. This has been good for my soul.

The honest Psalms, then, set the context for returning to the simpler affirmations. In the 23rd Psalm we pray, "You are with me," and so, "I have everything I need." We recite those words, even in our doubts, and we engage the very sovereignty of God. God *does* reign. If I trust that is true, then I can relax a bit and let God be God. And I'm never surprised to discover green pastures and still waters, even as I walk in the valley of shadows.

My morning recommendation? Take three Psalms and chew on them all day.

Christian Education: Growing in Faith and Love

In Luke's story, the presence and power of Jesus prevails over the sense of impurity and shame imposed by society. 
