WHEN WE ALL DO A LITTLE, IT ADDS UP TO A LOT!



Contrary to common perception, Jesus' disciples weren't frightened and hiding during the 10 days between Ascension and Pentecost. Instead, they were actively preparing for the promised gift of the Holy Spirit. They "all joined together constantly in prayer" (Acts 1:14, NIV) and took

steps to replace Judas. After that inward focus, the disciples were ready to boldly burst forth on Pentecost, empowered and "enabled" (Acts 2:4) by the Spirit. They proclaimed Christ's death and resurrection, leading 3,000 people to faith that day, now known as the church's birthday.

"A great wave of faith and love swept through this newborn community," writes Suzanne de Dietrich in *Free Men.* "These Christians could not keep silent. Their joyful liberty had broken down all the walls behind which people would like to keep them; no prison could silence them."

From the Pastor

May 2024

She said, "I was going to stop by and talk to you, but I knew you were busy." It was a well- intentioned comment, and I didn't take it the way that she intended.

Sometimes my calendar is full. March and October seem to be the most congested months, at least as far as my teaching schedule and special events. My December is crazy for the same reason it's crazy for you: family connections, holiday shopping, and the emotional congestion of "too much going on." Weekly schedules rise and fall; some are fuller than others.

But I must say busyness is a different matter altogether. A "busy pastor" is an unavailable pastor. Eugene Peterson, mentor to a previous generation of ministers, wrote that pastors get busy for two ignoble reasons. Either they are vain, wanting to look significant or important (e.g. "Wish I could help you, but I'm too busy"). Or the busy pastor is lazy, letting others fill up the schedule rather than having the clarity to say "no" to distractions. As Peterson writes to pastors,

It was a favorite theme of C.S. Lewis that only lazy people work hard. By lazily abdicating the essential work of deciding and directing, establishing values and setting goals, other people do it for us; then we find ourselves frantically, at the last minute, trying to satisfy a half dozen different demands on our time, none of which is essential to our vocation, to stave off the disaster of disappointing someone.

But if I vainly crowd my day with conspicuous activity or let others fill my day with imperious demands, I don't have time to do my proper work, the work to which I've been called. How can I lead people into the quiet place beside the still waters if I am in perpetual motion? How can I persuade a person to live by faith and not by works if I have to juggle my schedule constantly to make everything fit into place? (from *The Contemplative Pastor*, pp. 28-29)

Touche! What is a pastor's work anyway? The essential tasks are to pray, to study, to preach and teach, and to spend time with people. These are the holy matters, central to the pastor's vocation. As time, interest, and ability allow, other tasks can be taken up and shared. Yet the peculiar calling of a pastor is to avoid "busyness" for the sake of being available to both God and people.

I'm here for you. Unless I'm praying, studying, preaching, or teaching – in which case, I'm also here for you – but just in a different way.

P.S. – With a commitment to teach pastors for a week with the Board of Pensions, a daughter's grad school graduation, and a family wedding, my calendar for May is a little nutty. Especially around the weekends. But I'm around more than you might think. I love to drink coffee and I'm always happy to buy you a cup.

The Paragon Ragtime Orchestra (PRO) will bring its touring performance of "Meet Me at the Fair" to the church on Friday, May 10 at 7 p.m. The Paragon Ragtime Orchestra is the world's only year-round, professional ensemble re-creating "America's Original Music" - the exciting sounds of early musical theater, silent cinema, and vintage dance. This program features music from the Philadelphia, Chicago, Buffalo, and St. Louis world's fairs of the early 1900s and includes video clips of those fairs to go along with the music. The PRO came into being as the result of conductor Rick Benjamin's 1985 discovery of thousands of turn-of -the-century orchestra scores once belonging to Victrola recording star Arthur Pryor. In 1988 the Orchestra made its formal debut at Alice Tully Hall – the first concert ever presented at Lincoln Center by such an ensemble. Since then PRO has appeared at hundreds of leading arts venues, including the Ravinia Festival, the Smithsonian Institution, Chautauqua, the Brucknerhaus (Austria), the New York 92nd Street Y, and the American Dance Festival.

The concert is open to the public free of charge, with a free-will offering taken to help defray the costs of the event. For more information, contact the church office at 570-586-6306

May Volunteer Corner

This month the Volunteer Corner shines the spotlight on our Deacons.

For some inside information, I turned to Barbara Norton, the current Moderator. Her description: "Deacons are privileged to serve any member of our church family who is in

distress or need. In practical terms, that means works of caring for those who are grieving, ill or in crisis. We also make modest gifts on FPCCS' behalf to charitable

organizations that help our neighbors in need."

You see our Deacons in the Narthex and rear of the sanctuary each Sunday, greeting members and visitors and collecting the offering during worship. They also coordinate and serve funeral meals, home meals and may provide transportation to church services and activities.

While there are 17 elected Deacons, their work is supplemented by 55 non-Deacon volunteers. The number of volunteer hours they contribute is probably well over 1,000 per year.
