From the Pastor

September 2024

Here's something that jumped out at me in this issue of our newsletter: all the names of all the people in these pages. Now that I've mentioned that, take note of how many people are energizing our congregation.



It's striking.

In many congregations, a few volunteers carry much of the load. They do a lot. They are committed to showing up for every activity. Instinctively they fear that if they don't stay involved, the church could collapse. If a church is in danger of shrinking further, the dedicated core digs in. They are anxious about the congregation's survival. What will it take to keep our church going? Sadly, their anxiety doesn't make room for newcomers. The Precious Few have been doing all the work. They are reluctant for others to join in.

Other churches circle around their preacher. One of the indicators is that they refer to themselves as "Rev. So-and-So's Church." If a new idea surfaces, they wait to see if the preacher will approve it. If visitors drop by, they take their cue from how the preacher welcomes the newcomer. They love whomever their preacher loves. They reach only as far as their preacher can reach. This can become a personality cult. For the minister, it can also be a recipe for burnout, often self-inflicted. After the pastor's demise, the congregation plods along until it can find the next superstar.

What's astonishing about our congregation is how widely our ministry is shared. Take a few minutes to flip through the pages of this newsletter. Count up all the names of those who are involved. It is remarkable. Our work as a church is not dependent on any individual or a well-intentioned small group.

- Some churches define themselves by the number on their membership rolls. They brag about how big they are even if many of the members don't all show up.
- Other churches define themselves by attendance. Not by "how many are listed" in the church directory, but who actually comes on a Sunday. This is a better indicator of a church's health, but it can still signal passivity.

I'm happy that we are not defined by our membership rolls or attendance, but by the large proportion of folks who are doing something for Jesus, his dominion, and our neighborhood. I can't imagine any better sign that we are alive.

Of course, there is always room for more of us to engage in the work of the Church on the Hill. Want to do something that you see in this newsletter? Jump in. Contact one of those many names. Want to take on something that you believe needs to get done? Your pastor will give you permission – and your fellow Presbyterian friends will cheer you on.

Engagement. That's the word for our autumn together. Step up. Get involved. This is your invitation. God needs you.

is central to the gospel and the mission of the Church. Peace is possible, and it begins with us sowing the seeds of peace in every interaction and decision we make."



During September, a **Season of Peace** (sponsored by the Presbyterian Church, USA) will be observed for four weeks from Sunday September 8th until World Communion Sunday on October 6th. This month long pilgrimage is designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, small groups, families, and individuals. Participants are invited to deepen their calling as peacemakers through daily reflections that address some of the major issues of our time (climate change, nonviolence, the intersection of poverty and racism, and immigration/migration).

To receive these daily reflections in your email during Season of Peace, subscribe at pcusa.org/subscribeSOP or download the entire set of reflections as a single file at pcusa.org/seasonofpeace.

Also, as in last year, be on the lookout for Peace Cards that will be in the Narthex and on tables during coffee hour (they offer a question for reflection, an action to be taken and a prayer to be spoken).

During this Season of Peace, we will be collecting our **Peace and Global Witness Special Offering**. A gift to this offering enables the church to address systems of conflict and injustice across the world. 50% of this offering will be used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. 25% will be used by mid councils for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The final 25% is designated for local congregations to continue with peacemaking efforts of their choice. This year, we will be donating our **25% congregational portion** to the **Peace and Justice Center of Northeastern PA** in Wilkes-Barre, with the monies going to scholarships for their Peace Camp. The Peace and Justice Center is an interfaith organization created to nurture dialogue among diverse groups, to educate groups and individuals in peaceful ways of resolving conflict, and to be a partner in the ongoing struggle for human rights and a just world.

Patricia K. Tull, author of the 2024–2025 PW/Horizons Bible study Let Justice Roll

Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation, describes her call for creation justice in this way: "When I first learned of the climate crisis, I wondered how a biblical scholar with few practical skills could help, and found my purpose in learning about ecology and teaching people of faith what I could."

We invite all women to join in as we explore, with all our hearts, God's call to care for our neighbors and for creation.

A variety of topics are included: biblical understandings of land and food; toxic waste and its impacts; climate change and its relationship to local pollution; the invaluable gifts the ecosystem gives humans. We are called to care for creation because the earth and its members belong to God, but also, because a healthy creation sustains human well-being.

Join us on Tuesday, **September 24 and October 22** at **9 a.m.** in Fellowship Hall followed by Quilting at 10 a.m. We will resume our regular schedule of 3rd Tuesday at 10:00 in November.

Spiritual Formation Through Discipleship

Here's the thing about Spiritual Formation... It doesn't just happen. There's intentionality involved. And by its very nature, Christian formation does not happen without connection to God and other people. Fundamentally, spiritual formation happens through a relational process called Discipleship.

Pastor Carter is already well into a sermon series about discipleship, and we will start our Wednesday Bible study on September 4 in a similar place this Fall. Through much of September and October, we will utilize a study titled *Discipleship: The Way of Jesus*, by John P. Burgess, touching on a variety of themes:

Sept 4: Discipleship as the Way of Jesus


Sept 11: The Call to Discipleship

Sept 18: The Problem of Discipleship

Oct 9: Discipleship as Identity in Christ

Oct 16: Pathways of Discipleship

Oct 23: The Fruits of Discipleship



Somewhere in the middle, we'll take a brief break during September 25 and October 2 to talk about *Leading During Elections: Faithful Practices for Our Fractured Politics*. This, too, is part of our discipleship: Not that we intend to tell you who to vote for, or what party to support, or even how to think on every issue.

While some may focus on a discipleship that only asks, "Am I right with God?," it is important in the Biblical tradition to ask, "Are we right with one another?" It is not enough to "win," if others are being harmed by the views we support or even just the way the discussion is conducted. We are ultimately bound together as a community of faith by the way we love one another, and come to agreements that benefit the common good.

We hope you will join us on Wednesday nights. We plan to start a bit earlier at 5:45 pm to give more time for discussion. Some may choose to bag a light meal, such as soup and sandwich. Once in a while, we will let you know when we intend to host a common meal.

We will have a table set up after church, during the fellowship hour on Sunday, September 1, to answer any questions you may have about Christian Education this fall. Whether you are with us on Sundays and Wednesdays or find ways to connect with folks throughout the week, may Jesus be with us in all we say and do.

Highway Cleanup: October 5th





Christian Education: Growing in Faith and Love

The Christian Education and Growth committee is pleased to offer a number of opportunities for our children, youth, and adults to explore the Bible, understand our traditions, and experience ways to live in faith. We believe that faith formation is a lifelong practice, so we invite everyone to find a class, opportunity, or practice that will grow YOUR faith this fall and beyond.





Bible Time: An opportunity for our **young children** (age 4 to approx. grade 4) to hear Bible stories told in a fun and engaging way, weekly **Bible Time** will happen during worship, for about 20 minutes. Children will be invited to attend after the anthem and will return for prayers at the end of the service.

LIFT (Living in Faith Together): A regularly occurring **intergenerational program and meal** held after worship. We welcome families of all sizes and ages to break bread together as we hear God's word and engage with one another in discussion and activities. Our first program will happen on **Sunday, October 13,** after worship with a potluck lunch. We will also celebrate with an Advent program on **December 8** so mark your calendars for both events and spend time in fellowship with us!





We Worship Together series: A 30-minute program held after worship for children through grade 6. We Worship Together examines questions we have about church practices and traditions, such as Baptism, Lent, and the Apostles' Creed. Parents will be invited to sign up, and each family will receive a book to take home related to the topic discussed. Have you ever wondered why the worship service follows a certain order? Our first program this year

will be a 2-Sunday discussion of worship: what it is, why we do it, and more. Join us on **Sunday, November 3** and **Sunday, November 10**. The next class in the series will be held on **January 12** to learn about **baptism**.



We Believe: faith foundations for our pre-confirmation age youth. A mix of Bible 101, faith questions, and church basics to help prepare children in grade 6 and up for their confirmation journey, We Believe will be a combination of discussions, activities, and self-study. Parents will receive a letter with more information and a meeting date, or may contact Jana Schillinger with questions.
