From the Pastor

October 2024

On the brink of celebrating World Communion, we ask the question again: What does it mean, in this place, in this time, that God rules over human lives? What would it look like for us to build the love of God? To welcome the justice of God? To do the work of God?

When churches stop asking these questions, they go askew. Perhaps they get tangled in personality disputes, just like in the Bible: the "Sons of Thunder" start mouthing off rather than taking care of the neighborhood, or Matthew the tax-collector and Simon the revolutionary start plotting harm to one another in the parking lot after dark. If a church is merely a human organization, like any other organization, it can go off the rails in a hundred different ways. And it will need a Book of Order to keep Christian disciples from beating up on one another.

But the true church of Jesus is always more than a human organization. It is a holy fellowship, commissioned by Jesus to do the work of God. We welcome God's Breath to fill our lungs, we pray for God's Power to push us into action, and we know God's Spirit will fill our spirits. Christ infuses his people with his own presence. When we put a bridle on our own whims, when we submit our willfulness to God's greater will, the Gospel Message takes on skin and bones – and the world's demons can be chased away.

That is why we are here, my friends. That is why he chooses us. We are part of a world-wide movement to enflesh the life of Jesus Christ. We are here to love all the people that Jesus loves. We are here to do the work that Jesus inaugurated. And to every destructive power that threatens God's children, we say, "Christ is risen! Get you gone!"

Back in the year 1912, a lady named Mrs. William Gibbons moved into the little railroad town where I live. (That was her name: Mrs. William!) She was the wife of a missionary on furlough, and she discerned that God wanted Presbyterian Christians in her little town. She prayed, and then she gathered a dozen women. She sent them out to invite others to join them. She did that because God's work is never restricted by who we are; it is only restricted by our unwillingness to do the work.

We don't have to have faith figured out in advance. We don't have to be correct about everything. We need not compel everybody else to agree with us. We can't worry about who is on the list and who is not, because it is not our list. It is Christ's list.

On World Communion, we gather to declare Jesus our Lord is at the center of it all. His steady work of salvaging the world is the most important work of all. We do this work together, and we do it with him. It isn't easy. Crosses may be handed to us. Betrayers will appear from time to time. Faith will be tested. Even strong Simon Peter will have moments when he thinks he is unworthy.

But here we are, "chosen of the Lord and precious." We are the church that Christ chooses. We are the ones who bear his love to the world.

And I'm glad to be part of the church with all of you!





FPCCS Food Pantry In Partnership With CEO Weinberg Food Bank

Lesson Two: Land Justice

As we all know, European American settlers displaced a vast number of Indigenous inhabitants of the New World over the course of about three centuries. Estimates of the pre-European North American native population range widely – from a million to twelve million, according to one study.

Why should Christians care about this? For many reasons. Simple humanity, for one. For another, because this wholesale, often violent, displacement was sometimes justified by appeals to the Christian faith, to Christian morality. And because, even though the original players are all dead now, both the victims and their victors, the effects of this history live on in racism and impoverishment. And because, as we are now learning, the land ethics by which many tribes lived over the centuries were replaced by diminished understanding.


Spiritual Formation From the Beginning - Part 1

In his series, *The Chronicles of Narnia*, C.S. Lewis makes repeated mention of the "deep magic" which culminates in the "deeper magic" of the stone table. In *The Lion, The Witch, and The Wardrobe*, Aslan draws on this, offering himself for sacrifice only to rise again. But long before that, Aslan invests magic into creating Narnia in *The Magician's Nephew*. As we reflect on our world, are we able to draw from such "magic" in our lives? *How do we access spiritual formation at its very foun-dations?*

Breathe

As in *The Chronicles of Narnia*, the answer lies in the story of Creation in Genesis 1 & 2: "When God began to create the heavens and the earth, the earth was complete chaos, and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters." The story unfolds with movements of God's "expiration" in the form of words and breaths leading to the creative



"inspiration" of every facet of Creation. Breathing is fundamental to our existence, and yet under stress we instinctively hold our breath. *In those critical moments, it is important that we slow down and breathe most deeply.*

Rest

Another feature of the Creation story is the repetition of the phrase "And there was evening and there was morning, the [first, second, third...] day." Eugene Peterson, a well known author for matters of spiritual formation, notes that the Hebrew day always starts with evening. Before any mention of God's Sabbath rest, the daily rhythms of night and day provide structure. Sleep is a sacred act where we entrust our whole selves to God's protection and provision for a new day. *God's design is not that we should rest from our work, but that we should work from our rest.*

While at first glance, breathing and resting are simple basics of life, it is striking that a certain "magic" is uncovered when we engage them intentionally. Everyday activities can find meaning in our moments of inactivity, because we ultimately rely on God's Spirit. We were created to be embodied souls. A mindful approach to breathing and resting enlarges our view of life enough to make room for a God who is already there, eager to meet with us. *How might we pause at different times each day to take notice?*

In part 2, we will explore Creation notes about working and relating with one another. And our upcoming series for Wednesday night Bible study will be Creation Psalms. Come explore the "magic" with us:

October 30: Psalm 8 - The Majesty of God: Extending His Name and Image November 6: Psalm 33 - The Worship of God: His Power and Purposes in Creation November 13: Psalm 65 - The Farmer's Psalm: God's Care and Maintenance of Creation November 20: Psalm 104 - Lord of All Creation: From God, For God and To God

Christian Education: Growing in Faith and Love


