From the Pastor

Happy New Year! As 2025 begins, you and I are part of a "new" presbytery: Mountain Laurel Presbytery. Wait a second. Did somebody just stifle a yawn? Well, let me tell you why this is important. Next month, I will tell you how we got to this point.

Presbyterians are Christians who belong to one another. We have discerned a covenantal approach to the Christian faith. Through Jesus Christ, God has established a relationship with us (the word for that is "covenant"). Through that relationship, relationships with one another have been established. That is the genius of Presbyterian governance: the understanding that we participate in the Christian life together.

To flesh this out, we gather together for decisions and mission. The governing assumption is that all of us have wisdom, even if it's partial. If we band together, a deeper consensus forms. Resources can be pooled. Leadership will be broadly based, and less captive to an individual's personal magnetism. We are stronger together than if we are alone.

Granted, our American culture has been polluted by individualism. Whether it's the old myth of the go-it-alone cowboy or the idolization of celebrities who are famous for being famous, there is a toxic notion that "I alone know everything," that "I am the center of the universe." Churches can buy into that stuff when their preachers buy into that stuff. Hence, the proliferation of denominations — and now "independent churches." They splinter over infinitesimal points of theology, the outsized personality of their leaders, or a self-imposed seclusion from the real issues of human beings. The result? They coalesce around the presumption they are correct about all things. They have long ceased to do the harder work of talking to those who see things differently. Fractures form. Divisions separate. Is God honored by this?

Presbyterians believe in working together. That doesn't mean that all of them do, but our belief is that there is more wisdom within a group than there is in an individual. A group can be misguided, even wrong. Many human decisions are tainted by self-interest. Sometimes a prophet is called upon to point this out. Yet we never give up on traveling Christ's road together. As a lifelong Presbyterian, my mind and heart have been enlarged as the family of faith has helped me understand God's comprehensive activity and care in all things. I am not the solitary Christian I am tempted to be — because I belong to the Presbyterians.

We play out our values by the way we organize. A presbytery is a covenantal association of congregations in a regional area. They assent to an historical understanding of what Christians believe and do. They honor diversity while insisting on unity. They pursue policies and practices that benefit the largest number of people. They hold one another accountable. They make hard decisions that a singular congregation cannot make on its own. They offer personal support from the larger group. They share the mission money around. In all things, they seek the mind of Christ.

The news is that the Presbytery of Lackawanna (*us*) has begun a merger with the Presbytery of Lehigh (*them*) to become the Mountain Laurel Presbytery (*we*). It's a long process which I'll sketch briefly next month. Yet it is a good example of who we are and what, by God's grace, we aspire to become. I will tell you about it in our February newsletter.

Presbyterian Women's Bible Study Lesson Five: Air Quality

Tuesday, January 21, 10 a.m., Fellowship Hall

Main Idea: the wind itself often signals a holy moment, and is related to both our breath and God's, both our spirit and God's.

From the outset of Scripture's story of life, air has been associated with God, who breathes life into every human and animal. Lesson 5 discusses air quality issues, specifically those related to certain types of animal farming; vehicle emissions (especially ozone and carbon monoxide); sulfur dioxide and nitrogen dioxide from burning coal, oil, and gas; and lead smelting. It especially raises awareness of dangers from factories and refineries along Cancer Alley in Louisiana.

They gather for conversation at 8:30 a.m. in the Session Room (206) and have their study from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. They are working through the Acts of the Apostles with Rev. Bill. Christian Education: Growing in Faith and Love

Bible Time: Hear Bible stories told just for our young children during worship. We Believe: Faith foundations for our pre-confirmation age youth is a mix of Bible 101, faith questions, and church basics to help prepare children in grade 6 and up for their confirmation journey. This curriculum, "We Believe" is a combination of discussions, activities, and self-study.



Sudan - World's Forgotten War

Sudan, Africa's third largest nation, has been engulfed in civil war since fighting erupted in April 2023 between the nation's military, the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF), and a paramilitary group known as the Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

While the world focuses on the expanding mid-east crises in Gaza and Lebanon, and the Ukraine–Russia conflict, Sudan has been deteriorating into the world's worst humanitarian crises, including the world's worst famine in 40 years.

This represents an historic failure in the global aid system, with the international appeal for funds falling short by 60%.

The mass suffering is unimaginable, with an estimated 755,000 people facing famine. Another 25.6 million people, or nearly half of the country's population, are facing acute hunger. 10.5 million people have been displaced, with approximately half of those being children.

The United Nations has documented an alarming rise in sexual assault and rape on the part of the largely male combatants, the vast majority of them being RSF members. Asylum seekers have reported experiencing or witnessing abduction, assault, rape, or other forms of gender based violence. An almost inconceivable number of women are facing this gender based violence, estimated at 6.7 million.

At the U.N. General Assembly in September 2024, the U.S. ambassador, referring to Sudan, referenced "Compassion Collapse", defined as the human tendency to turn away from mass suffering. This article is being written to address this failure, and hopefully to heighten our awareness of this increasingly dire situation.

The Mission and Justice Committee has donated funds to the Presbyterian Hunger Program, to be directed to Sudan. In so doing, we pray for acknowledgment and recognition of the plight of the Sudanese people by the world community, with a response that is both constructive and comprehensive. During this holiday season, let us be ever mindful of our own good fortunes, and in turn, let us be ever mindful of the needs of others less fortunate, many of whom suffer in silence.

From the Generosity Team

Your gift to the FPCCS Endowment Fund supports a thriving community of faith, one that makes a difference in the lives of our church family, our neighbors, and the world.

Beginning with a \$5,000 contribution in 2019, the Endowment Fund has grown to a value of approximately \$170,000. In 2024, the Fund distributed income of \$5,619 to the church, which was used to cover a portion of our general operating expenses. The Generosity Team encourages our parishioners and friends to make generous contributions to the Endowment Fund to generate even greater earnings to help meet current and future expenses. Consistent growth of the Endowment Fund will help to put our congregation on a stronger, more stable financial footing.

Our fund is managed by The Presbyterian Foundation. For over two hundred years, the Foundation's funds have created long-term, sustainable value and income in perpetuity for churches and donors. The Foundation currently manages over 7,000 permanent endowment funds and 3,500 charitable gift vehicles, totaling over \$1 billion. It distributes over \$100 million annually for mission and ministry.

There are many ways to give:

- Cash: checks written to the FPCCS Endowment Fund during a donor's lifetime
- **Securities**: a gift of appreciated securities may allow a donor to claim a charitable contribution deduction, avoid income taxes on capital gains, and reduce the size of their estate
- **Bequest:** may be written to give a stated amount, a percentage of the donor's estate, or a residual amount after estate expenses and other bequests have been deducted
- Endowing a Pledge: for example, a gift to the Fund of \$100,000 with a return of 5% would perpetually fund the donor's current annual pledge of \$5,000
- Life Insurance: name the FPCCS Endowment Fund as the beneficiary on a life insurance policy or transfer ownership of the policy to the Endowment Fund
- Retirement plans: obtain an IRA or 401(k)/403(b) change of beneficiary form and indicate the amount or percentage of retirement assets that are designated for the Endowment Fund

IT'S A LOT!

So if you're among the folks who appreciate the Arts program please take the time to thank John and Dick, the Arts co-chairs, for all their hard work.

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


