## For forty days and forty nights: The Season of Lent

March 5 is designated as Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the season of Lent. We will mark it with a worship service at 7:00 p.m., preceded by an adult education class at 5:45 p.m. But what is Lent? Here are seven quick questions and answers:

- 1) How long is the season? Lent lasts for forty days.
- 2) Why forty days? Forty is a recurring number in the Bible, signifying "a good long time." Jesus fasted in the wilderness for forty days before he began his ministry. That is probably the origin.
- 3) On the calendar, it's forty-six days from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Why? We don't count the Sundays, which are regarded as "Little Easters."
- 4) Do I have to give up chocolate for Lent?
  Presbyterians don't impose spiritual prohibitions
  on their church members. But we do suggest that
  we keep this season as a way to deepen our faith
  and reconnect with God.

- 5) What are ways to deepen faith and reconnect with God? Certainly fasting is a time-honored discipline. Fasting is a voluntary restraint from overindulgence of any kind. We watch out for overeating, mind our words, guard our thoughts, even restrict our TV watching. And there are also positive actions we can take: reading the Bible, meditating, praying, journaling, or contributing money and time to those in need.
- 6) What's the purpose of keeping this season? The spiritual life does not come easy for any of us. It requires discipline and attention if we are to shape our lives more like Christ. Try taking on one specific practice for forty days. Keep at it.
- 7) What is our church's theme for Lent? This year, we invite you to Come Home with Luke. That is, the Gospel of Luke. He speaks of "repentance" as a return to God (see page 3). That's our invitation. And if you haven't been with us in worship, why not join us on Sunday? We'd love to see you!

## From the Pastor

Dear Friends—

We begin the season of Lent with the prophet Joel. In his book, he makes the ultimate invitation, which will be our churchwide theme for the season: "Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing." (Joel 2:13)

In one of his stories, Garrison Keillor describes the return of those who wandered away from Lake Wobegon Lutheran Church. It was Christmas time, he says, and the exiles came home. One of them is Larry Sorenson, dubbed "Larry the Sad Boy." He had been saved twelve times in the Lutheran church, an all-time record. Keillor describes him:

In the course of eight years, he threw himself weeping and contrite on God's throne of grace on twelve separate occasions – and this in a Lutheran church that wasn't evangelical, had no altar call, no organist playing "Just As I Am Without One Plea" while a choir hummed and a guy with shiny hair took hold of your heartstrings and played you like a cheap guitar – this is the Lutheran church, not a bunch of hillbillies – these are Scandinavians, and they repent in the same way that they sin: discretely, tastefully, at the proper time, and bring a Jell-o salad for afterward. Larry came forward weeping buckets and crumpled up at the communion rail, to the amazement of the minister, who had developed a dry sermon about stewardship, and who now had to put his arm around this limp soggy individual and pray with him and see if he had a ride home. Twelve times. Even the fundamentalists got tired of him. Granted, we're born in original sin and are worthless and vile, but twelve conversions are too many.

Keillor has his tongue in cheek, of course. He knows we are prone to wander from the God we love. He also knows there is a good bit of religious play-acting that smacks of fakery. Repentance is the invitation to return to God. To cancel our excuses. To dispel our distractions. To turn away and turn back. To journey to where we are most deeply loved.

Perhaps old Larry didn't understand the true character of God. He imagined a finger-wagging Deity who was ready to dish out guilt and hurl thunderbolts at wayward sinners. By contrast, the prophet Joel perceived a different Mystery at work. Reaching deeply into Israel's greatest statement of faith, he declares God is "gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing."

This is our hope, too, for we have seen God in the person and work of Jesus of Nazareth. His invitation persists, once, twice, a dozen times, a thousand times. "Return to me," says the Lord, "with all your heart." Your broken heart. Your cracked-open heart. Your defenseless heart. Your available heart. Your joyful heart. Your loving heart. "Return to me."

Lent is the open season for returning. Been away? Come home. Not sure how to return? Just come. Anxious how you will be received? You'll be received with open arms. Fearful what others might think? Oh, we already think the world of you.

Come home. God is waiting.

As people of faith we are called to speak out to urge our society to act for just transitions in this fast-changing world.

## From the Generosity Team

Recall this account from Matthew 4:18-22: "As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea--for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fish for people.' Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother



John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him." In chapter nine of the same Gospel, we read: "As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax booth; and he said to him, 'Follow me.' And he got up and followed him."

These disciples answered Jesus' call willingly; they did not say, "let someone else do it" or "pick someone else Lord." Too often in the life of the church we rely on someone else to do the things that need to be done in order to carry out its mission and ministry. The church is God's house and, just as in any household, there are many tasks to be completed by its members.

Our congregation maintains a membership directory. No one named "Someone Else" is in it. "Someone Else" cannot offer financial support, time, or talents. Only we can do that! Like the disciples in the Gospel accounts, it is we who should answer Christ's call and, in so doing, take an active role in the church. Search your heart, recognize your talents, and give them back to God.

All that we have is not ours; it is the Lord's. May we continue to return to God a generous portion of the great bounty that has been given to us.




